The London Free Press has discovered a new disease. It says: "The prevailing epidemic of influenza has been named 'Opencar Catarrh.' Like la grippe, the symptoms are of the wildest possible range. In one case it takes the form of a severe cold; in another it is bronchial in its nature; in others it has a rheumatic tendency, producing auralgia, stiff necks, etc., and frequently terminating in pneumonia and death. The disease is caused by a germ which is carried in the wind that howls around the unprotected passengers of the open cars as the trolleys rush along at railroad speed. It is a peculiarly penetrating organism, and few there be who escape it. The microbe, fortunately, is confined to the open cars, so that a complete preventative is the storing of the summer rolling stock and bringing into commission the closed cars."
