A PLAGUE OF TARANTULAS.

Almost Upon Mr. C. E. Gilbert's Face.

San Antonio, June 21.—The past few months seem to have been favorable for the propagation of tarantulas. The weather has been unusually dry, and the poisonous things are now more numerous in this city and throughout southwest Texas than ever before known. Some very narrow escapes from the sting of the tarantula are reported in this city.

The other day, while C. E. Gilbert was taking a siesta on a bed in a rear room of his store building, his rest was suddenly disturbed by something dropping near his head on the pillow, and he saw a large tarantula coming directly toward his face only a few inches away. Mr. Gilbert reached the floor in a single bound, and was looking around for something with which to kill the inveder, when his attention was attracted by another tarantula which had entered the room from the rear door, and was evidently seeking its companion. With the aid of a wooden paddle and a large paper sack Mr. Gilbert bagged both tarantulas. Placing them in a glass case, he then returned to search for more. He had hardly reached the back yard when he saw two more tarantulas moving along side by side toward the open door over the graveled walk. He bagged these, and presently three more were found, and all were captured. The whole family of seven were reunited by being placed in the glass case, where they have become tame, and now amuse persons by snapping flies and other insects placed in their cage.

The tarantula pest is complained of in nearly all parts of Mxico. Owing to the prolonged drought in the State of Durango they have become so numerous that the lives of childden are in constant danger. The statistics recently compiled by the Government of that State show that one-tenth of the deaths of children in the city of Durango were produced by the fatal sting of the tarantula. our friends find difficulty in getting the paper anywhere, let

LEGAL QUERIES.

Fence Rails.—A and B own lands on each side of a creek, which during a recent freshet carried off about 1,000 fence rails from B's and about 600 from B's lands. The rails passed across a road and lodged against a jam on the lands of C. Can C give these rails to D after appropriating to his own use what may be necessary to rebuild his own fence which was carried off below the jam in which the rails of A and B lodged? ANS.—The ownership of the rails still remains in A and B if they can identify them, and C has therefore no right to take them for his own use or to give away. A and B may lawfully enter upon the lands of C to recover their rails, but must do no unnecessary damage in doing so.

WIDDER.—I. A owns 150 acres and B 200 acres adjoining. A's lot is fenced on the north side and B's on south side. Forty acres in the rear of A's lot is bush, and 80 acres of B's lot in the rear is bush, with no fence between. A's lot is leased, and his tenant turns cattle into the bush. Can B compel A to build his share of line fence, B having done his share of fence? ANS.—Not upon the facts as stated. 2. Weuld you consider that A's tenant occupied his part of the bush when he used it for pasture. ANS.—Not unless the 40 acres is feced on the other side. 3. What is the meaning of occupied lands in law? ANS.—Being inclosed in the highway and used for any purpose, such as a nursery, pasture, dwelling, pleasure grounds, park, etc.
