—On Monday next (civil holiday) another excursion will be given to Detroit for \$1.75 via the Grand Trunk. The excursion is under the patronage of the C. M. B. A. Society of this city, and will be largely attended. The train leaves at 7:50 a.m. and returns at 10 p.m. Excursionists will have the opportunity of seeing the Barnum circus, which is in Detroit that day.

—John Jaynes, the liquor informer who was the cause of a good many exposures in that line in this city last fall, has been given similar work in Hamilton, where a number of hotel and saloon keepers have come before the police magistrate's notice through the exercise of his profession. In the course of testimony here, Jaynes detailed some of his London experiences and said he worked at the carpentering business here for Mr. Tuckett. Mr. Jaynes, it will be remembered, was assaulted in East London one evening last fall up for some weeks with severe injuries.

Died from His Injuries.

Oliver B. Harris, the man who was injured Monday by falling from a ladder while working at his residence, died Tuesday afternoon in the City Hospital. The deceased was badly hurt about the head having alighted on that part of his body. He was about 44 years of age, was employed at Stevens & Burns, and leaves a widow and family. The funeral takes place this afternoon from 363 Hill Street.

Premiere Concert in the City Hall.

"D" Company band rendered sweet music at a promenade concert given Tuesday in the City Hall, by London Lodge, No. 139, Order of Fraternal Goodwill.

Invitations had been sent around by the society members and the attendance was satisfactory. The Union Jack and the Stars and Stripes draped the platform.

Mayor Joseph C. E. Phillips, the supreme guardian, and his party were expected, but sent a telegram stating that a wash-out on the C. P. R. would prevent their appearance. The local secretary of the committee, Mr. John Paul, spoke for a short time, dealing with the principles of the order. The membership was about 9,000 with 200 lodges, rapidly increasing in numbers. Philadelphia was its center, but it was international in operation. U. S. Consul Leonard also made a brief speech, laudatory of the fraternal orders. He conferred with a good education and brotherly influence.

A Good Idea.

Secretary Browne has laid before the Western Fair Board a very nice idea, which, if put into practice, will make an agreeable addition to the great Western Fair. He communicated with several societies in the city, and also the bicycle clubs, asking if they would co-operate in a proposed parade on one of the Fair days.

Probably the Monday. The answers received were very encouraging, and the suggestion highly approved of on all hands. It was decided by the Board to solicit the aid of the various fraternal orders, the city cyclists and others in the project, and no doubt the effort will materialize very creditably. The scheme is an encouraging one, characteristic of Western Fair management. If carried into effect it will form a handsome and perhaps permanent feature of the exhibition and tend to impress visitors as an evidence of the interest taken by citizens.

A Significant Difference in South London.

It is announced that in South London (Ward 6 in the city) the "assessment roll of 1890 has been made the basis of the Dominion voters' list in the south riding of Middlesex. In consequence of this difference from the mode adopted in the city it becomes necessary for everyone who lives in London South, and who has not been a household for at least two years, to make a declaration of his right to vote."

To secure a vote everyone who has purchased property in the ward within two years, or who has only become resident since Jan. 1, 1890, should call on Squire Currie, corner Elmwood Avenue and Cathcart street, any evening between now and Friday evening next, 14th inst., when the list will close.

Mr. Currie will attend to take the necessary declaration from 7 till 9. The task is an important one, as whether the new ward will be a portion of the city or continued as a division of South Middlesex, it is well that the full Liberal vote should be secured.
