FATAL FIRE NEAR LUCAN.

Mrs. John Davis Burned to Death -Her Husband Severely Injured.

He made desperate efforts to enter the house again through the door and windows, but was repulsed each time by smoke and flames. In his efforts to rescue his wife Mr. Davis was badly burnt and cut by window glass. All that could be tound of the remains of Mrs. Davis could be put in a quart measure. It is supposed the fire started from a defective stovepipe.


