

### ERITANNIA WINS AGAIN

Beating America's Prize Yacht for the Sixth Time.

The Vigilant Shows Up Better in Strong Wind - The Britisher Better Handled-Noted Detroit Cricketers Coming.

BRITAIN VS. AMERICA AGAIN. ROTHSAY, July 12 .- The last of the Clyde regattas was sailed today over the quadrangular course of the Royal Northern Yacht Club, where the Vigilant was badly worsted yesterday, largely on account of baffling winds and calms. The length of the course is about 50 miles. There was a moderate westerly wind blowing across Rothsay Sound. The race Prescriptions was for a prize of £60. The sky was cloudless.

The starting gun boomed at 10:30 a.m. The wind was on the starboard bow. The Vigilant crossed the line at 10:30:30, somewhat to leeward of the Britannia, which was timed three seconds later. Both carried jib topsails and club topsails. The Britannia cut the weather of the center boarder and forged ahead. The Vigilant soon closed up the gap. Then in pursuance of its summer custom the wind dropped to merely a soft breeze and came in pulls. Both boats heeled a little as they bore off shore near Ascog. The wind was freer in the channel. The Yankee stuck to the Britannia. Approaching Mount Stuart she reached short and booms went far to port. The Britannia increased her lead to about 100 yards. The yachts rounded Mount Stuart in the following time: Britannia, 10:45:40; Vigilant, 10:55:

In the ten and a half leagues with the wind, from Mount Stuart to Largs, spinnakers were set to starboard. The Yankee boat gradually drew up on the Britannia. Near Tomont, about threelee of the Great Cumbrae the breeze was the damaging evidence. steadier. The Britannia rounded the Largs mark boat at 11:39:30; Vigilant at 11:40:30. These figures show that the in the run before the breeze.

Yankee craft picked up nineteen seconds The wind freshened and the towering sticks of the giants heeled to starboard under the pressure on their wealth of canvas. At Knock Castle the Britannia was leading by two minutes and eight seconds. The Vigilant set a small jib top sail, apparently expecting the wind to Wemyss buoy mark at 12:69:57; Vigilant, 12:13:34. The Britannia gained 2 minutes and 37 seconds on this 41 mile leg. She was 3 minutes and 37 seconds ahead. It was weather work from Wemyss to the home mark. The Vigilant again demonstrated that she was better at pointing than her rival, which appeared to be a trifle superior in footing.
