ROSEBERY ON THE SITUATION

Transvaal Government Trying to
"Put Back the Clock."

Britons Should Present a United
Front to the Foe.

Close of the War Session of Parliament—No Intervention by Outsiders—Offer From American Women Accepted With Thanks.

London, Oct. 28.—Lord Rosebery, speaking at a private dinner of politicians, referred to the war and to the heavy loss of life, saying that they had to deplore the death of Gen. Symons, and before they sheathed the sword there would be many more such losses. In the meanwhile, he added, the country ought to present a united front to the enemy. In his opinion the Transvaal was not a very complicated question, but merely the effort of a community to

"PUT BACK THE CLOCK."
Referring to Majuba Hill, Lord Rosebery said Mr. Gladstone's action was determined by the belief that the power of Great Britain was so great that she could afford to do things without risk. The Boers regarded Mr. Gladstone's magnanimity as a proof of weakness upon which they could encourage. Dwellings in the unfriendliness of the foreign press and foreign public opinion, Lord Rosebery said: "This is no little war. There are nations watching with eagerness every trip every stumble, and much more, every catastrophe and disaster that may overtake our arms. War waged under these conditions, therefore, is not a little war. It is a war in which the Boers should attract so much ill-feeling. There is one simple test that will apply to the British community as compared with other empires who with their high and mighty won't say malice—but candid, feeling."

BRITAIN FOR PEACE.
"We would be only too glad at the present moment to strike a bargain with the rest of the world that every frontier should remain as now. Of what other empire can that be said? Yet we who are striving our best to maintain peace, and the highest sense of the object of the concealed dislike of governments who, I think, are less single-minded than ourselves."

Lord Rosebery, in an impassioned peroration, called upon the nation to maintain a united front, speaking of Great Britain as a lonely island, and on these northern seas viewed with such jealousy, such hostility, such jarred ambition, by the great empires of the world, which count their armies with embattled phalanxes, and amidst stormy applause, with Shakespeare's words: "Naught shall make us rue, if England herself shall remain unshaken." **BEVERFORD ATTACKS ROSEBERY.**
Rear-Admiral Sir Charles Beverford, speaking at Glasgow in regard to Lord Rosebery's candidature for the rectorship of the university, said he admired the speaker's character as a politician, but opposed him as a politician. The speaker charged Lord Rosebery with following instead of leading public opinion, and asserted that he was largely responsible for the Transvaal's resistance and the present war, because he has remained silent until war actually began, and the Transvaal had taken its stand in the Transvaal war, and the country was divided on the issue. Lord Charles said in the course of his speech: "I am not sure that the Boers have not been advised to fight by the members of the Transvaal government prepared for all contingencies."

WAR SESSION ENDED.
In the House of Lords, at 2 o'clock yesterday, the Queen's speech was read, and the lord high chancellor declared the session closed. The speaker read the Queen's speech, after which the members of the House of Lords, and the House adjourned.

NO INTERVENTION.
An authoritative statement was issued in Paris on Friday formally denying the rumors of intended Franco-Russian intervention in the Transvaal war, and declaring that France has no ground and no desire for any such intervention at present, and that Russia is likely to place its hands behind the Transvaal, adding that Germany is the only power directly concerned in the matter.

AMERICAN AID.
The government has gratefully accepted the offer of aid from the American people in England to equip the steamer Maine, which has been lent without charge to the British government by the Atlantic Transportation Company as a hospital ship for use in South African waters.

The English-born residents of Spokane, Wash., at a meeting, decided to raise \$5,000 for the relief of the orphans of the British soldiers killed in the South African war. Those present subscribed \$400.

VOLUNTEERS FROM MANILA.
An informal meeting was held at Manila by the men proposing to proceed to South Africa to fight with the British. Over 100 Englishmen, Australians and Americans decided to go. They organized a party, and believe they can secure 200 more men. The volunteers include ex-soldiers, frontiersmen, Englishmen familiar with the Transvaal, and commercial clerks.

A BYE-ELECTION.
The parliamentary bye-election for the Bow and Bromley division of Tower Hamlets, London, held yesterday to replace Mr. John R. Healey (Conservative) resulted in a victory for the government candidate by 4,223 votes, against 2,134 votes for the Liberal and Radical opponent. The Conservative majority was practically twice that secured at the election of Mr. Healey. The constituency, which is mainly of the working class, plumped for Mr. Chamberlain and war.

LORD ROSEBERY DEPARTED.
LORD KELVIN.
London, Oct. 28.—Lord Rosebery has been elected rector of Glasgow University by 829 votes to 515 votes cast for Lord Kelvin.

FRENCH CRUISERS FOR THE CAPE.
Paris, Oct. 28.—The French asserts that five cruisers of the French squadron now at the Piraeus, the port of Athens, have been ordered to place themselves in readiness to go to the Cape.

GERMANY'S NAVY TO BE DOUBLED.

Berlin, Oct. 28.—The Berliner Tageblatt declares that the imperial government intends to double the strength of the navy. The reason given is the great increase of the navy of America, which is evidently destined to become a great sea power.

Recital at the Auditorium.

The first recital of the Popular Concert Course was given at the Auditorium last evening before a large and appreciative audience. The stage was artistically decorated with palms, for the floral arrangements have been confided to Mr. Gammage for the entire course.

In response to the rousing yet moving ballad, "Off to Philadelphia," audiences need a little of the entertaining as a foil to the classic and effective. Mr. Hewlett, who played the solos, is too well known to need praise; he accompanied both singers with his usual skill, displaying that admirable faculty of making one forget the accompaniment in the accompanied.

The next concert is to be given on Nov. 3. It is to be hoped that the hall will be brilliantly lighted, as many complained of the glare from the too numerous electric lights. These might be replaced by the footlights.

FITZPATRICK'S LOGIC

In Support of Canada's Aid to the Empire—A Striking Analogy.

Montreal, Oct. 27.—Hon. Charles Fitzpatrick, solicitor-general of Canada, in a letter to Le Soleil, of Quebec, says: "If the English minority in Quebec were to seize the government, were to bestow upon certain Englishmen special privileges, were to compel the entire population of the province to buy certain goods from those Englishmen only, and to deny them the rights to buy from anybody else; if they were to be taxed enormously for the public schools and permitted to teach nothing but English in the French districts; if they were to raise for school purposes a far larger sum of money than was required, and were to divide this money among English officials; if they were to disarm the entire French-speaking population and refuse to them all political rights; if they were to put them in jail on suspicion, and after detaining them there for months, discharge them without a trial, there would be in Quebec a state of things faintly resembling the Boer government of the Transvaal. How long would the French population tamely submit to such a thing? Not for a month. Yet for a period of ten years the government of England has been remonstrating with Kruger against his robbing government. It is high time that such a government, so treating the subjects of her majesty and other Europeans found in their midst, should be treated as a nuisance, and it is an honor to this country to take part in putting an end to such an intolerance and robber-like organization. Considered by the light of parliamentary precedent and constitutional authority, Canada's action in the Transvaal matter may have been, as has been recently stated irregular and technically unjustifiable, but this is not a time for legal disputation. The appeal to arms is made not only on behalf of our fellow-subjects and of others who suffer on our borders, but because the Queen's authority is defied, and her dominions in South Africa are invaded. To such conditions the rule 'Salus populi suprema lex' may safely be applied."

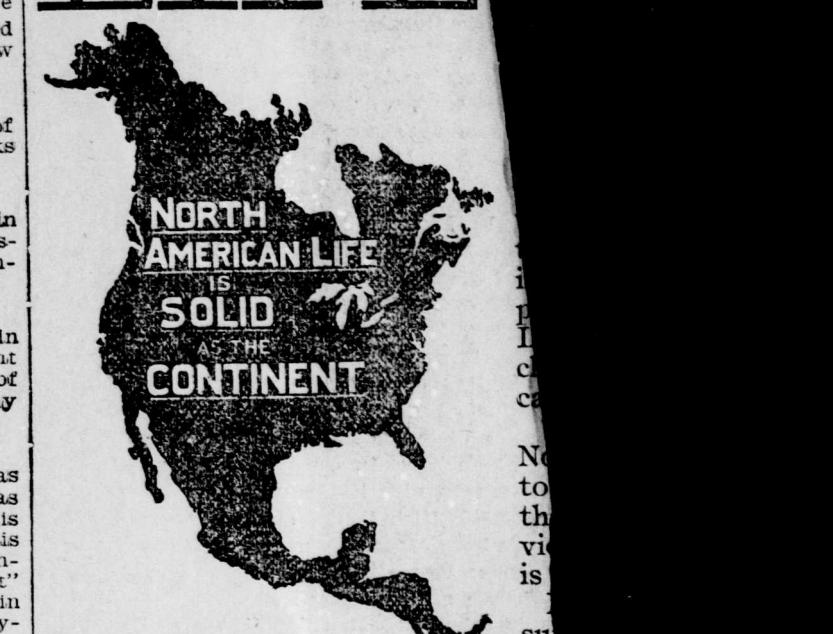
