at that place for some time, the signi-ficance of Gen. Botha's statement is not quite clear. BOERS' PROGRESS BARRED. Elandslaagte last evening reported that there has been no traces of the Boers in that neighborhood for the past two days. Their progress southward has been effectively the British occupation of Jonenoskop on the left and Umbulwana on the right. The belief that the Boers' action on Tuesday was due to restless-ness and dissatisfaction in the ranks is confirmed by natives, who say the Boers have been ready for some time and wanted the British to attack them. In order to force this the Boers commenced shelling, at the same time sending a force to make a flanking movement on the left. The natives also confirm the statement that one

of the Boers' heavy guns was put out of action and the gunners driven off. PROTEST FROM LORD ROBERTS. Bloemfontein, April 14.-Lord Roberts has strongly protested to President Kruger against the treatment of prisoners, sick and wounded, in the hands of the Boers, and has formally de-manded the observance of the Geneva convention. Lord Roberts, in his telegram of protest to President Kruger. complains that the Boers have treated them as if criminals, confined in jail. He points out that there are 90 cases of enteric fever and dysentery in the prisoners' camp at Waterval; that the Transvaal Government failed to supply, on demand of the doctor, the necessary medicines and medical comforts; that the prisoners were forced to bivouac on the open yeldt; that the sick were placed in an open shed with an iron roof, and that it was only when the new doctor threatened to resign that medicine and mattresses were supplied. He invites President Kruger to remedy this state of things, and contrasts it with the treatment of the British Government to the Boer prisoners, sick or wounded, who, as Lord Roberts says, "receive the same treatment as our own soldiers." Four farmers who took oath to abstain from further co-operation with the Queen's enemies were found sig-

Leemokop, southeast of Bloemfonein, Monday, April 9.-The Boer command, which is still in the southern district, and which it was feared had been cut off, has rendered a good account of itself with the Basutoland poice, who had invaded the Orange Free State. Four British scouts, who were captured, say that Bloemfontein is hard pressed for water. They add that all the private water wells were guarded, and civilians were not permitted to use them until the troops were sup-plied. Commandant De Wet has received a report that the British who fled from Smithfield southward were severely punished by the burghers of Rouxville. News received here from Johannesburg Drift says a British force of about 1,000 men, mainly composed of Brabant's Horse, with Gen. Brabant commanding, is surrounded at Robertson's mills, with a remote chance of re-

lief or effective resistance. The British force reported in the dispatch from Leemokop to be sur-rounded at Robertson's mills is probably the force of colonial troops previously referred to as surrounded by the are not commanded by Gen.
