### BLAKE AT BATH.

Extracts From a Recent Able Speech.

At Bath, England, recently, the Hon Edward Blake was the resipient of a per fect ovation. He was the speaker of the day, and the local papers reported his speech verbatim. They cut off Ireland, they take away Wales, they take away Scotland, and they take old England by itself; they say there is an overwhelming majority of 70—which, as I have shown, cught to be only ten—in England against home rule, that they will not count Ireland, that they do not attach much importance to Wales, that Scotland is not of much account; and because England by itself has so decided it is impossible that the measure can be carried. (Laughter and cheers.) CHEESE-MAKING AT AVON

An Interesting Meeting of Butter and Cheese Makers.

Cheese Makers.

There was quite an interesting cheese and butter meeting in Avon a few days ago. Mr. Morris, cheese maker, took the chair at 2 o'clock p. m., a large and interested audience being in attendance.

Mr. Dillon, manager of Mount Elgin croamery, gave an interesting address on the profits received from butter making. He showed that it paid the farmers better to make butter after November than to make cheese, and he strongly advised farmers to turn their attention to winter dairying. He believed by building silos and feeding ensilage the farmers could milk their cows much longer in the season.

Mr. Ruddick, manager of the experimental station, Woodstock, strongly approved of paying patrons of cheese factories according to the amount of butter fat. This has been done in the past season at the Aylmer factory with the best results, and they are going to continue. This is easily done by the use of the Babcock tester. He showed by a table of figures obtained by experimenting that the man who sent good milk. He contended that paying for milk according to quality would improve the quality of our cheese, and that it would do away with tampering with milk.

Mr. Wheaton, secretary Western Dairymen's Association, gave a very interesting address on the general management of farm

milk.

Mr. Wheaton, secretary Western Dairymen's Association, gave a very interesting address on the general management of farm work. He thought that dairying was the business of the farmers of Ontario, and urged upon the farmers to feed ensilage and attend to the small things in connection with dairying, such as keeping the cans clean and the milk strained and properly cooled. He condemned the practice of putting milk in cold water to cool it, but recommended stirring it immediately after taken from the cows and keeping it away from stable odors, as the proper care of milk added very much the quantity of butter fat. He also recommended farmers to try Prof. Robertson's mixed ensilage, which is horse beans, sunflower and corn, and urged the farmers to join the Western Dairymen's Association. He obtained quite a number of members.

Mr. Casswell gave an address on the dairy business, but thought the log business more profitable, and urged the farmers to raise hogs for bacon. He referred to the Danes, who had prospered in the business, and wound up with reading an essay.

Mr. Williams, inspector, gave a very interesting address on dairy work and urged the farmers to discontinue the practice of carrying the whey home in the same cans that the milk was conveyed to the factory in, and recommended elevating the whey by steam and also paying for milk by the "test."
