THE ONTARIO ORANGEMEN

Annual Meeting of Grand Lodge at Petrolia.

Grand Black Chapter Chooses Officers—Interesting Reports Presented.

Petrolia, Ont., March 12.—The annual meeting of the Provincial Grand Orange Lodge of Ontario West was convened in the town hall here today, Grand Master McMillan, of Toronto, presiding. There was a good representation present from all parts of Ontario West.

The grand master, in his address, referred to the general harmony that existed in the ranks of the association at the present time. He also alluded to the visit of the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York, the grand reception tendered them by royal subjects, and the many good impressions they left on the people. His concluding words in the matter were: "The outcome of the royal visit will necessarily be of great advantage to Canada, and must eventually divert to our shores a large proportion of the surplus population of the old land, who desire to emigrate." He also referred to the assassination of President McKinley, and spoke of the sympathy of the Canadian people in connection therewith. He referred to the death of the late M. W. grand master, N. Clark Wallace, M.P., and paid a fitting tribute to his ability and sterling qualities of their deceased leader.

GROWTH OF THE ORDER.

According to the report of the grand secretary, the following new lodges are organized during the year: No. 217, at Blind River, county of East Algoma; No. 731, at Minnissing, county of West Simcoe; No. 738, at Orville, county of Huron; No. 921, at Spanish Station, county of Nipissing; No. 1,237, at Port Stanley, county of Elgin; No. 1,762, at Lakeside, county of South Bruce; No. 1,767, at Keewauke, county of Itahy River; No. 1,769, at Grimsby, county of Lincoln; No. 833, resuscitated, in the county of Oxford; No. 363, resuscitated, in the county of York; No. 1,237, at Port Stanley, county of Elgin; No. 1,762, at Lakeside, county of South Bruce; No. 1,767, at Keewauke, county of Itahy River; No. 1,769, at Grimsby, county of Lincoln; No. 833, resuscitated, in the county of Oxford; No. 363, resuscitated, in the county of York.

During the year, as follows: Initiated 1,238; joined by certificate, 427; reinstated, 214; total, 2,079; withdrawal by certificate, 491; died, 168; expelled, 30; net increase, 1,418.

The grand treasurer, Bro. E. F. Clarke, M.P., reports the finances in a very flourishing condition. The total receipts, including balance from last year, were \$2,774.30; the expenditures, \$1,941.23, leaving the net balance of \$1,832.97 to the credit of the grand lodge.

A public meeting was held in the town hall tonight, at which addresses were delivered by Dr. Sproule, M.P.; John McMillan, of Toronto; E. P. Ed-ward, of London; D. M. Jernyn, of Wil-arton, and others. From present appearance there does not seem to be anything coming up for discussion at the grand lodge sessions. Wingham and Guelph are working for the grand lodge meeting next year, with the chances in favor of the former.

J. S. Leighton, of Toronto, manager of the Orange Mutual Insurance branch, and T. A. Duff are both on the ground, and are getting in good work for the insurance department.

THE GRAND BLACK CHAPTER.

The annual session of the Grand Black Chapter of Ontario West was held this morning. The following officers were elected: Grand master, Sir Knight W. J. Dunlop, of Toronto; deputy G. M., Sir Knight Wilson, of Petrolia. The officers were duly installed by Sir Knight Wm. Lee, P.G.M., of Toronto.

A resolution of condolence was passed to the widow of the late Hon. A. Clarke Wallace, and a vote of thanks was tendered to Royal Black Lodge, No. 429.

CHEAPER TO ANSWER.

Montreal, March 13.—The first action in connection with the recent census for refusing to answer questions has been taken by the commissioner against the Canada Thread Company. The Dominion Government has decided that the company, as a company, can be sued and fined \$40 a day for every day after conviction that it refuses to answer questions.

CRIPPLE REGAINS USE OF HIS LEGS.

Montreal, March 13.—Michael Gold-berg, a 14-year-old newsboy, who formerly crawled around on his hands and knees, owing to deformation, has been dismissed from the Western General Hospital as cured by a new method of treatment. After the treatment, called "forced correction," had been applied, the boy was incased in plaster from head to foot. The operation was successful in every way.

PRESBYTERIAN HOME MIS-SIONS.

Toronto, March 13.—At the opening session of the Presbyterian home mission board, the questions of the succession to Rev. Dr. Robertson, former western superintendent, and the general condition of the missions in Manitoba, the Territories and British Columbia were considered at some length. The growth of the church in Western Canada during the past few years has been enormous, and many members of the committee were of the opinion that at least two, and probably three, men would be necessary to take up and continue the work of the late superintendent. A recommendation from the western portion of the church was to the effect that a general secretary of home missions be appointed, with two assistants. This was referred to a committee for consideration. The sums voted during the afternoon totaled \$52,000, distributed as follows: Manitoba and Northwest Territories, \$18,000; British Columbia, \$23,000; Yukon Territory, \$4,000; work among the farming people west of Ontario, \$7,000.
