East Middlesex Commissioners Wil Lay Down Law to Hotelmen.

At a meeting of the East Middlesex license commissioners on Saturday afternoon, licenses for the full year were granted to the Young House at Crumlin and the Barrows House at Putnam. A three-months' extension was granted the Homister House on the Hamilton road and to the Maker House at Crumlin.

It was incidentally mentioned at the meeting that there is a possibility of the Barrows House being sold for the purpose of converting it into a church. If the deal goes through Putnam will be without a hotel.

At another meeting of the board, which is being held this afternoon, the licenses will be handed over to the hotel men, and the new rules relative to the keeping of a register for guests, and the pulling up of the blinds or bars during prohibited hours, will be laid down to the proprietors.

NOW IS THE TIME

Spraying Done This Month Will Save Much Work Later On.

An agricultural exchange points out that the most important work to be done this month is spraying. A day in the orchard and garden now and then will save many days' hard work of doubtful value later in the season. The general rule is to neglect preventive measures until too late, unil after the insects have got a good start. The fruit trees need careful attention now. Experience of careful and intelligent fruiterers show that spraying every two weeks from the 1st of May to the last of July has given the highest per cent of perfect fruit, but the most profitable returns for the work done have been produced by spraying four times in the spring. Two sprayings in the early spring have not improved the value of the fruit enough to pay for the work. Spray the trees as soon as the blossoms fall, and then repeat the application every two weeks unti four sprayings have been made is the method that has afforded the best protection against the coddling moth.
