

THE GREED OF THE LORDS DRIVING THEM TO OBLIVION

Powerful Arraignment of the Peers by the Chancellor Lloyd-George in Which He Gives Some More Examples of the Inequalities of Taxation.

(Special to The Advertiser.)

London, Dec. 31 .- In refuting the contention of the Conservatives that persistence in the policy of Free Trade created unemployment, David Lloyd-George, Chancellor the Exchequer, addressing a meeting in Queen's Hall tonight, argued that unemployment is more prevalent in protectionist countries than in England. He cited the United States, which he described as "the protectionists' paradise, where customs officers line the shores like cherubim, with flaming swords keep every foreign-made article out of this garden of Eden, but once inside you find the serpent of hunger, want and unemployment hissing in every grade,"

Mr. Lloyd-George quoted statistics showing that in May, 1908, while there was 30 per cent of unemployment in New York States, there was only a seventh per cent in England.

London, Dec. 31.-The Chancellor of the Exchequer spoke three times at Cardiff in one day, and in the evening at Swausea. His first speech

rising and cheering for several moments, said that on the occasion of the last convention, a little over a year ago, be pointed out that the Liberal Government was not altogether responsible for the fact that a number of important measures had not become acts of Parliament. There was an education bill, so moderate in the final form in which it was offered that the Catholic members of the House of Commons actually voted to disagree with the Lords' amendments. (Hear, hear.) They were on the eve of sending up to the House of Lords a licensing bill.

"You know what happened," he proceeded. "There was a council meeting in the throne room of Lansdowne House-(laughter and cheers)-and the bill was thrown out as the result of that drawing-room meeting. (Hear, hear.) He had a valuation bill, and everybody knows how harmy ine valuation grievance bears upon the commerce and trade of the country, and how easily it lets off people not engaged in any particular business except that of consumption. (Laughter.) Bills have been rejected; bills have been mutilated. They have done it very skillfully up to the present, but at last the House of Lords has blundered. (Hear, hear.) Greed is the wildest of all chauffeurs, and the House of Lords has dashed madly under the impulse of its driver. (Cheers.) I think they have discovered it, but too late, luckily." (Cheers.)
