#### 1A COLD STORAGE PLANT FOR CHEESE

A cold storage plant for cheese will installed in the dairy building at the Western Fair this year. Secretary Hunt made this announcement at a meeting of the dairy and honey committee of the Western Fair, which was held in the fair offices yesterday afternoon. An appropriation for this work had been made by the executive and inancial committees.

It is expected that this will materially add to the number of exhibitors, as heretofore the fact that there has not been any protection for cheese has prevented many from exhibiting. Offers were received from the Canada Salt Company of Windsor of a silver cup for the butter-making competition

A Silver Cup.
The A M. Smith Company, of this city, also donated a silver cup for the cheese scoring the highest number of points. It is also expected that there will be quite a number of other prizes donated by city merchants and manu-facturers. The judges in this department were then chosen.

In the honey section, on account of the absence of a couple of members of the Beekeepers' Association, who were to meet the committee, business in this section was adjourned till a week from Saturday. It is expected that one of the results of this meeting will be the arrangement for a practical demonstration of the care of bees.


