## PEERS SURRENDER HEREDITARY RIGHT

Division on Resolution Was 175 Years to 17 Days.

## OLD GUARD CHAMPIONS

Virile Earl of Wemyss, Aged 92, and Strenuous Earl of Halsbury Put Up Pugnacious Fight.

London, March 23.—By a vote of 175 to 17 the House of Lords last night renounced the hereditary right to legislate, which has been a cardinal element of the British Upper House for centuries.

The occasion of the fateful division was Lord Rosebery's third resolution, dealing with the reform of the House. Yesterday the House agreed nem con that reform and reconstruction were necessary.

The resolution which was passed last night was:

"That a necessary preliminary to such reform and reconstruction is acceptance of the principle that possession of a peerage should no longer of itself give the right to sit and vote in the House of Lords."

It is significant that fewer than 200 of the 615 members of the House shared in the fateful division. Many of the absentees were reluctant to sanction the extinction of the hereditary principle. Nevertheless, they so far recognized its expediency as not to oppose it. Not a few, indeed, of the majority who supported the resolution would have retained their hereditary right, but recognition of that expediency guided their votes.

The Old Guard.

The resolution, indeed, might have been carried unanimously but for the resolute pugnacity of two tenacious old fighters, the Earl of Halsbury and the Earl of Wemyss, the latter of whom has been actively identified for many years with volunteer soldiering and with the National Rifle Association, and who is still virile, despite his 92 years, while the Earl of Halsbury is so young and strenuous at 55 that he lately voluntarily returned to the judicial bench to resume the sick judge's duties.

Some of the speakers who supported the resolution could not find it in any region of the hereditary principle. Among these was the Marquis of Lansdowne, who pointed out to the House that it was possible to vote for the resolution with the full intention of proposing afterwards that the House should consist entirely of hereditary peers.

The resolution, he said, was the necessary gate to three main principles, namely, the removal of the old blood, a reduction of numbers, and a remedy for the disparity in party strength.

Earl Bathurst, one of the old guard, gave the House a good laugh, solemnly warning the members that if they threw away their hereditary right their descendants to the third and fourth generations might turn and rend them.

Members of the Government among the peers refused to give more than platonic approval to the resolution, to which, the lord chancellor said, they ought not to attach fetitious importance. Nevertheless, he, the Earl of Crewe, Viscount Morley and other liberal peers, voted with the majority.
