

The best and most practical way of washing corduroy is to place it in suds and rub the goods with a soft brush. Rinse without wringing and hang the goods straight upon the line. Press on the wrong side until per-fectly dry, using a Turkish towel unmaterial. It is not generally Hot Rolls. known that corduroy can be dyed.

Add the margin with machine stitching, having the rows the space of a stitch part, and working across the band from the lower to the upper edge.
