The Tailor's Way

The real novelty-loving woman will have the buttons attached with patent fasteners, so that she can wear different sets of buttons with different skirts. Attractive suggestions of dressiness, which does not conflict with the general style of the waist, are the lace jabots spreading from the ends of the Rouspierre collar, and the sleeve frills.

Three Ways to Cook Cornstarch

Cornstarch Jelly For Invalids.

Mix in a tumbler 1 teaspoonful of cornstarch with a little cold water. Pour sufficient boiling water on it to form a clear jelly, stirring it well all the time the water is being poured on. Then add a cupful of cordial and a little sugar.

Soup Balls With Cornstarch.

Blend 2 tablespoonfuls of cornstarch with half a pint of milk. Put it into a saucepan and add 1 tablespoonful of butter. Bring to a boil and boil 5 minutes, stirring all the time. Take it off the fire and allow it to cool slightly. Add a well-beaten egg, 1 tablespoonful of fine bread crumbs, half a teaspoonful of salt, a quarter of a teaspoonful of pepper and 1 tablespoonful of chopped parsley. Form into small balls with a spoon. Pour into boiling water and poach for 3 minutes.

Cornstarch Omelet.

Separate the yolks of 2 eggs from the white. Beat up the yolks in a small basin and add a pinch of salt. Blend 1 tablespoonful of cornstarch with three-quarters of a cupful of milk and add the yolks to it. Season with pepper and salt and fold in the stiffly-beaten whites. Put half a tablespoonful of butter into the pan. Let it get hot, then pour in the mixture slowly. Shake the pan gently over the fire. When the omelet is set and the underside slightly browned, put it in the oven till the upper side is browned. Add 1 tablespoonful of cooked, chopped chicken or cooked ham, tongue or kidney. Double over and put on a hot dish. Serve at once.

Dry-Clean.

To dry-clean corsets, lay corsets on a table, as flat as possible, and rub with pumice powder, using a firm piece of flannel. Moisten the powder and apply where there are very dark marks, leave as a paste to dry and roll up till next day. When dry, brush with clean brush. This powder will also take greasy marks out of a delicate silk dress.

Mend Gloves.

Sometimes a kid glove tears just when it is needed for wear. If there isn't time to sew them, paste a strip of court plaster on the underside to hold the torn edges together. The rip will scarcely show. The gloves will wear well without further mending for a long time.

Varnished Floors.

Use cold water only in washing varnished floors. This removes the dust and dirt easily. The cold water hardens the varnish and leaves the surface smooth and clean.

TO BLEACH FADED DRESSES.

Summer dresses that have already begun to fade and that are yet too good to throw away, can be bleached white by soaking for fifteen minutes in two gallons of soft water, into which one pound of chloride of lime and a teaspoonful of soda ash have been dissolved. Rinse thoroughly and dry in sunshine.
