We received a telephone set, and I took one phone and wire out in front to be able to phone back all hap-penings. It was a telegraph-telephone set, and I managed it on one wire. After I had it set up, Capt. Collins started the buzzer going from his end, and I could not stop him quick, so the unusual noise startled someone in the German lines and caused them to drop about six star shells on us. A few wild shots, which always go that way at night, decided us about returning. I shall calm the buzzer down and try it again.




