FARMERS PLEAD FOR UNITY; HULL MEETING WARM

Opposing Factions Provide Fireworks Galore in Effort to Organize.

(Canadian Press.) OTTAWA, Jan. 9.—Unity was conspicuous by its absence when the farmers of Ottawa, Pontiac and La Belle Counties met at the Hull registry office this afternoon in the hope of effecting the formation of a United Farmers' Organization.

About 100 farmers, supporters of the United Farmers of Quebec, and the Inter-Provincial Farmers' Organization, were in attendance, and there were plenty of fireworks between the opposing factions. Both sides tried to monopolize the proceedings and personalities were plentiful. Finally a committee of eight was appointed to proceed with organization, draw up a platform, and prepare by-laws to govern the party.

Arthur McConnell of Hull, declared there were too many lawyers in politics and in the Federal Government. He urged nationalization of banks and insurance when the farmers got into power. V. Dougherty of Buckingham, second vice-president of the United Farmers of Quebec, declared that the farmers had to fight the Manufacturers' Association and the James McLaren Company. This raised a storm of protest, and the speaker was finally requested by the chairman to avoid such statements. He said the farmers must "For God's sake," be urged "let us get away from the old political organizations which have practically ruined this country."

D. Bell of Wright County, and F. Fortin, president of the United Farmers of Quebec, pleaded for unity. "If you would give better service to yourselves, your neighbors and the country, unite," Mr. Fortin said.

FAIRLY CERTAIN OF NEW FRANCHISE ACT BEING INTRODUCED

Notorious War-Time Act Still Stands On Books.

NOTICIOUS WAR-TIME ACT STILL STANDS ON BOOKS.

Secretary of State Has Automatic Power To Denaturalize Citizen—No Appeal.

OTTAWA, Jan. 9.—It is now fairly certain that a new franchise act, which shall be almost purely federal in character, even so far as lists are concerned, will be brought down during the coming session. In the general opinion of the authorities here the war-time election act of notorious fame, while repealed for purposes of elections, still stands for purposes of general elections upon the statute books, but its retention there would not be popular. The disfranchising features of the war-time election act will not be perpetuated, though defaulters who refused to fight for their country will be deprived for a period of the right to vote for parliamentary representatives. Any restrictions of the franchise may be exercised by the secretary of state Hon. A. L. Sifton, in whom is vested powers under amendments of the naturalization act of the session of 1912. Very little in the matter of granting naturalization, but also in the matter of denaturalizing men already naturalized under any law formerly existing. As an instance of the wide powers conferred the secretary of state under the new act may cancel a naturalization certificate because the holder was not of good character when he received it, and the secretary of state is the judge of "character." There is no appeal from his judgment.

DECEMBER ADDS 20 MILLIONS TO CANADA'S DEBT

Little Hope For Relief From Burden of War Taxation.

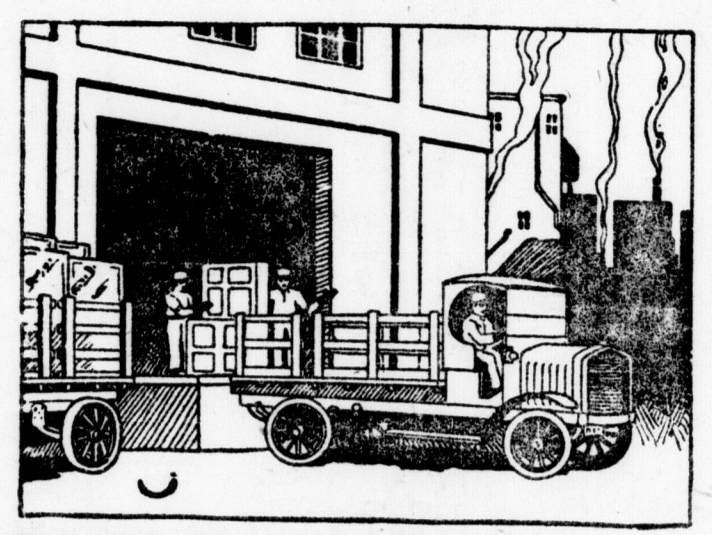
OTTAWA, Jan. 9.—The December balance sheet of the finance department issued this afternoon holds out little hope of relief from war taxation. Excess of ordinary revenue over ordinary expenditure was in December only \$1,300,000. In December of last year the excess was \$12,000,000. For the nine months ending with the close of the calendar year ordinary revenue was \$235,984,000 and ordinary expenditure \$237,220,000—an excess of revenue over expenditure of \$1,244,000. During the corresponding nine months of 1918 ordinary revenue was \$222,485,000 and ordinary expenditure \$124,539,000—an excess of revenue over expenditure of \$97,946,000. Total expenditure on capital account (including war) during the nine months was \$222,000,000. During the corresponding nine months of 1918 it was \$236,000,000. The net debt was increased during December by 20,291,000. It now totals \$1,838,131,058.

J. K. L. ROSS RESIGNS STEEL FIRM POSITION

MONTREAL, Jan. 9.—At the annual meeting this afternoon of the Dominion Steel Corporation, Commander J. K. L. Ross tendered his resignation. The vacancy was not filled, but the directorship and the appointments of the following to the newly-constituted London advisory committee of the corporation: Vice-president, Furness, Sir William Beardmore, Gen. the Hon. Sir Newton Moore, Henry Steel, Benjamin Tubb and Col. W. Grant Morrison, all associated with the English interests which recently acquired 50,000 shares of the corporation's common stock. 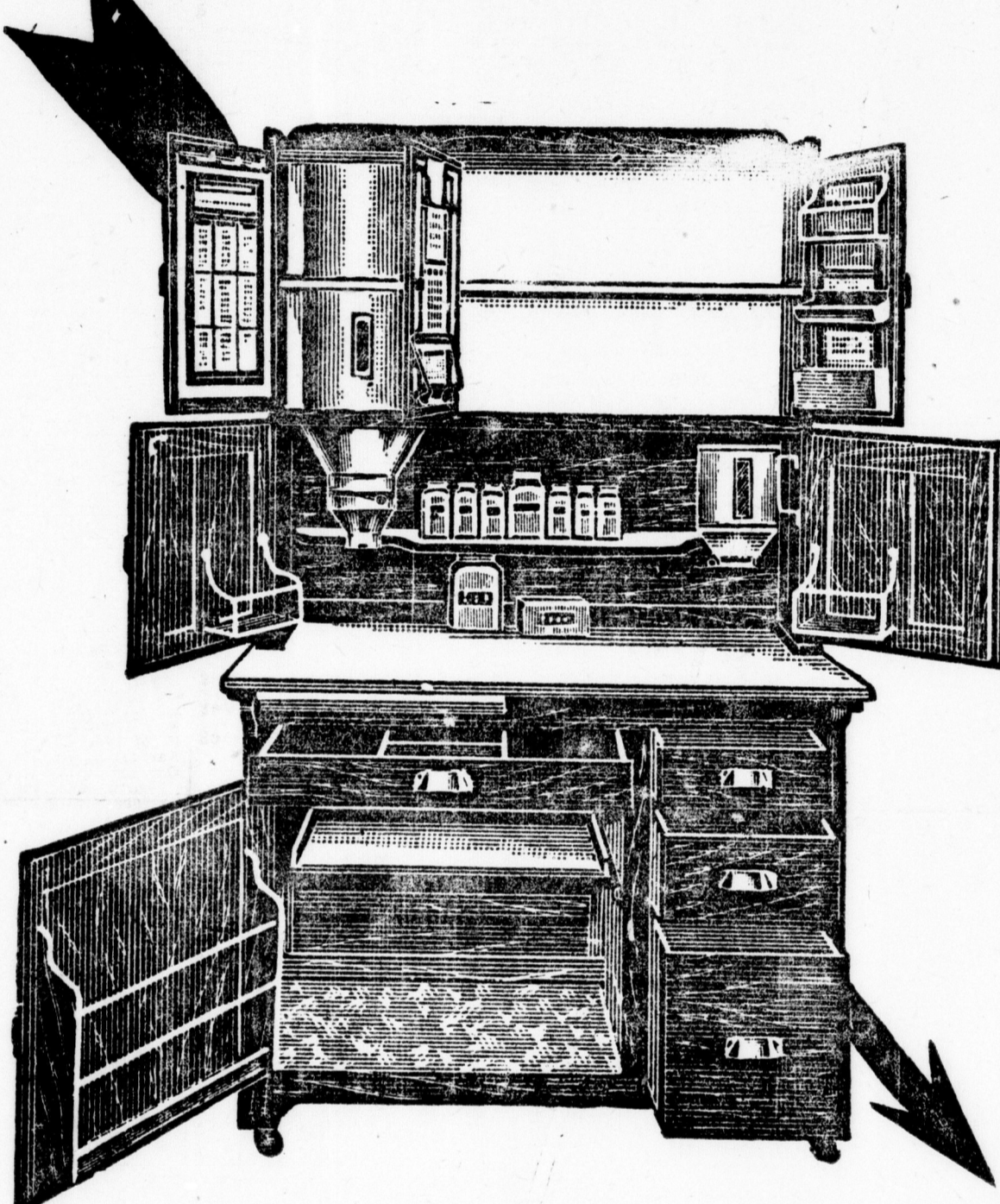
