LIBERTY SHORT LIVED

Convicts Made Daring Getaway From Los Angeles Jail Tuesday.

Los Angeles, Oct. 17.-Herbert Wilson, former evangelist, mail and convicted murderer; Adam Blaszyk, convicted murderer, and Guido Spignola, convicted robber, who broke jail here yesterday, were recaptured here today after 24 hours' liberty. They were taken without a struggle in a home of a former convict.

Wilson, former traveling evange list, and native of London, Ontario, showed his usual self-control, according to Sheriff Traeger.

"He saw the crowd outside, and saw that we had men with guns inside, and he came to the door smiling," the sheriff said.

His record since then has won for him from the authorities the title "Master Criminal."



BECK REPORTS TRACKLESS CAR IS ECONOMICAL

Prefers Electric Bus Used in Windsor Over Gas-Driven Car.

GIVES PRICE COMPARISON

Acting Mayor Childs Believes Trolley Type Would Prove Asset.

That trackless trolley buses, as designed by the Hydro-Electric Power Commission and operated at . the Border Cities, are far more economical as a means of civic transportation than the gasoline bus, is the gist of a detailed comparative statement, prepared by Sir Adam Beck, chairman of the commission. and submitted Wednesday by Acting Mayor H. J. Childs, chairman of the finance committee of the city coun-

cil. The data follows: Comparison of operation expenses Gasoline costs (American) 28 cents per Imperial gollon; gasoline costs (Canadian) 38 cents per Imperial

The gasoline bus costs 24 cents per car mile to operate, as against approximately 18 cents for operating the trolley bus, that is 30 cents increase for gasoline over the trolley. Life of gas motors-100,000 to 200,-

Life of electric motors-750,000 miles to 1,000,000 miles. Power costs: Two cents per car mile for the electric bus, with four to six cents per car mile for the
