"What do you intend to do about the Middlesex county police court?" This is the question that will be asked Attorney-General W. E. Raney at a special session of the Ontario cabinet Friday afternoon, according to Dr. Hugh A. Stevenson, M. L. A. for the city of London, who declared to The Advertiser Thursday afternoon that "Police Magistrate A. H. M. Graydon had assured him that he would withdraw all authority from Squire W. H. Chittick to preside in the Middlesex county police court."

Questioned on this point Magistrate Graydon, while declining to state that he had acted as stated by the member for London, declared that he was quite ready to do so when

called upon by the government.

All the members of the provincial legislature for the county of Middle-sex will journey to the capital Friday when the entire question will be brought to the attention of the attorney-general. "I intend to ask him what he proposes to do about it, was the emphatic statement from Dr.

## May Make Negligent Pay For Fighting Fires

VANCOUVER, B. C., Aug. 10 personal liability for fire bill was read and indorsed at the annual meeting of the Association of Canadian Fire Marshals here yesterday.

This act, which will come into force sixty days after receiving royal assent, will be adopted by every province. The purpose of the act is to enable fire departments to recover the cost of extinguishing fires from persons who, through criminal negligence, are responsible.
