Associated Press Despatch Moscow, Feb. 16 .- Russian prison conditions appear to have improved lowing the bolshevik revolution, a much less drastic and more humane regime evidently having been adopted in both the criminal and political

The foreign correspondents, at the invitation of the soviet government, yesterday inspected the famous Cheka prison in Loubianka square, Moscow, which, as the headquarters of the entire G. P. U. system (state political police) has been the most feared institution in all Russia. The newspapermen found to their surprise that instead of long rows of dark, cold, iron-barred cells there were nearly 100 large, well lighted, well ventilated rooms with such forts as steam heat, electric light, parquet floors and papered walls, all scrupulously clean.

Eighty political prisoners, 10 per cent of them women, occupy these rooms. The heds for the most part are made of boards and have rudely made straw ticks as mattresses, but made straw ticks as mattresses, they are more comfortable than the sleeping accommodations in most

The Cheka building was formerly one of the principal hotels in Mos-cow and still bears many vestiges of its former equipment and conveniences. A medical clinic forms one of the features of the prison.
