POWER OF THE PRESS.

Lord Northcliffe had a few things to say about the power of the press in New York recently. The press, he declared, was powerful for good or ill. It can bind sundered people together in concord and friendship, or it can be used for purposes calculated to perpetuate misunderstanding and lead to war. A "bad press" may work havoc in the general mind. The printed word, he said, speaks with authority. It says the final word. Governments have used the press for their own selfish schemes. They have cozened the public with press communication calculated to deceive. He instance how Napoleon had bluffed the people of France when he was editor of the "Montiteur." He accused Napoleon of making the most mendacious statements from day to day to deceive the public. "A free press, in a wide democracy, can do an infinitely more of harm by reckless statements." He further pointed out that "a free press, able, alert, giving the news, but consecrated to the public service, could be the noblest and most potent instrument in the world in the bringing in of general righteousness."

CONFERENCE AT WINNIPEG.

Arrangements are being made to hold a conference of all those engaged in work in behalf of dependent and delinquent children in Canada at Winnipeg, on October 6th and 7th. Committees to draw up the programme and deal with other matters are being named.

SUSPENDED SENTENCE.

A young man who was arrested on Saturday evening, charged with creating a disturbance on York Street, was given a suspended sentence of thirty days by Judge Cameron this morning. The accused, who pleaded guilty, was instructed to leave the city and go to his place of residence in the country. The Chief of Police received instructions from the Judge to have the prisoner arrested and the sentence of thirty days automatically put in force if discovered in the city again.—Gleaner.
