### CURRENT COMMENT

It is estimated that the recent Provin cial election and referendum cost not less than \$1,200,000. Not a great many years ago a poll was manned at a cost of \$6-\$3 for the returning officer, \$2 for the poll clerk, and \$1 for the constable. In the recent election these officials were paid exactly three times these figures. and as many of the polls had a double crew the cost was still further increased. The printing of the lists of voters also was a very heavy item.—Ex.

The Government is understood to be considering the abandoning the War Saving Stamp idea and replacing it with another one. The War Saving Stamp scheme has never been a success, for several reasons. In the first place, it was suggested in Canada because of the results which had attended it in the United States; but over there they had it under way while the war was at its height, and the people responsive. The Government is now understood to be considering a scheme to replace the stamps with Saving Certificates, leaving out the war idea. The new issue will bear interest at the rate of five per cent. and be non-taxable. Probably the sale of the stamps will continue until the end of the year so as to dispose of as many as possible of those on hand. The amount of the new issue has not yet been decided on.

One of the last acts of Hon. Dr. Cody as Minister of Education, was to complete arrangements with the University authorities to provide for joint examinations for matriculation and entrance to Normal Schools and Faculties of Education. Dr. Cody for some time past had een negotiating with the University au thorities, with the object of reducing and simplifying the examinations required for high school pupils. The high schools in the past have been required to prepare candidates for two types and standards of examinations based on the same courses. By the new arrangement the work of the schools will be materially lessened, and the pupils will have the opportunity of qualitying at the same examination for entrance to the Normal Schools or the Faculties of Education and the Universities.

New express packing rules will go into effect on December 10th. The new rules will not permit the use of paper wrapping for packages over 24 pounds, nor ordinary paper boxes, wrapped, or unwrapped, when the weight of package is over that limit. For shipments over 25 pounds, wooden containers, or containers of fibrewood, pulpwood or corrugated strawpoard material are required. The cartons must be made of materials of specified "test strengths," similar to those required for the freight service, and the containers must bear the stamp of the manufacturers to certify that the material used is of strength required for the weight of the shipment carried in it. Shippers who wish to acquaint themselves with the new express regulations would do well to study these rules, copies of which may be secured at any express office.
