Glad to report that the sick ones are all improving. Some are able to be out again.

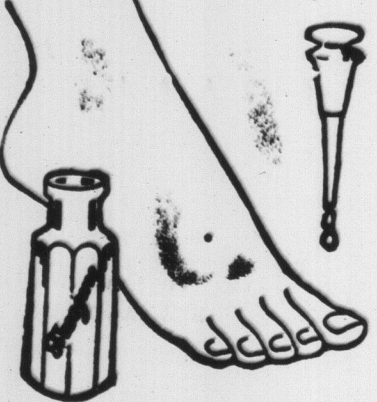
Marjorie Marshall and Helen Mason left the 7th to visit Mrs. Richard Tretheway at Northfield.
