Though weak, the power was not as much reduced as one would imagine when looking at the patient. She had the characteristic Parkinson face and attitude of this disease. There were no areas of anesthesia or analgesia, and she detected heat and cold well by the tests. However, she seemed insensible to cold; when exposed to low temperature she does not complain of any discomfort. She had the subjective sense of heat in her spine and feet. At the time of the onset of the disease there is a history of mental depression, and the patient made at that time two separate attempts at suicide, once by throwing herself into the cistern, and again by taking hellebore which she At present the patient is very self-centered and vomited. states that one in her hopeless condition of misery should not be allowed to live. Her memory is good and she knows what is going on about her, appreciates kindness and is interested in doing some needle work. She remains in the Hospital unchanged.
