TORONTO MARKETS. The quotations previously noted in broadstuffs continues, if anything on an intended scale.

WHEAT. - The only transactions reported, was of one car No. 1 white, at \$1.42, in store. On the street, the few farmers' loads coming in brought \$1.43 for white, \$1.36 for red, and \$1.30 for spring.

GRAIN. - Holders throughout the country are somewhat anxious as to the future of this grain, and are inclined to accept present prices rather than run the risk of a further decline, but the demand here is very limited, and to make sales to any extent would be almost impossible.

HARVEY. - There is no special demand to note. An order for a round lot for shipment, to which reference has previously been made, was filled to-day on terms not made public.

Wool. - The market was steady all day, 52c. being the current rate at which several rounds of 2,000 to 4,000 lbs. were taken. 60c. was reported at 60c., but this is exceptional. There is very little now to come forward from farmers, but there is a good deal still held on speculation at various points throughout the country.
