" The Phantom Ship," "Snarley-yow," and " Olla Podrida" are volunes just added to the library edition of Marryatt now issuing from the press of Messrs. Little, Brown \& Co The latter volume includes "The Pirate" and "The Three Cutters."
"The Definition, Object and Sphere of Taxation" will be treated by David A. Wells in Appletons' l'opular Science Monthly for September. Many popular errors as to the nature of Taxation, some centuries old, will be pointed out in this paper.

Early in October The Century Co. will issue Mr. Chester Bailey Fernald's first book, "The Cat and the Cherub, and other Stories," and forthcoming numbers of the Century magazine are to contain short stories from his Fen. Mr. Fernald is the son of Frank L. Fer. nald, Naval Constructor, U.S.N. Father and son having lived for a considerable time in San Francisco, the young author found his fiction types in the Chinese quarter.
