

CHAPTER 6: ORGANISATION AND FUNCTIONS

88. The Committee considers that NATO is at present form as capable of discharging the non-military functions required of it. Strategic purposes are not needed. The motive is to make use of its organisational structures. If it is for Governmental purposes to make use of it.

89. At the same time, certain improvements in the process gives the organisation of the Organisation will be required if the recommendations of this report are to be fully implemented. The proposals in this Chapter are aimed for this purpose.

A. Meetings of the Council

90. More time should be allowed for Ministerial Meetings. Experience has shown that sufficient time is needed more often. Decisions cannot be made quickly enough to be effective if they are to be reached by 11, or will be delayed only in an emergency form.

91. Elliotts should be made of encyclopaedic discussions after meetings for negotiations should be made with this in view. Not most sessions, the members present should be specially invited. In order of precedence this discussion, when Ministers wish to speak in a language other than English, consecutive translation should be provided by interpreters from their own delegations.

92. Meetings of Foreign Ministers should be held whenever decided, and discussions offer than NATO need. Ministers might also participate more frequently in regular Council meetings, even though not all of them may find it necessary to attend such meetings at the same time. The Council of Permanent Representatives has powers of effective decision: in other words, the authority of the Council as such is the same whether Governmental documents are to be issued by the same Permanent Representatives. Thus there should be no difficulty of formal joint meetings between Ministers and other meetings of the Council.

B. Strengthening the links Between the Council and Member Governments

93. It is indispensable to the kind of consultation envisaged in this report that Permanent Representatives should be in a position to seek support effectively and to reflect the current thinking of their Government. Differences in position and in constitution do not make impossible such multilateral discussions in the interest of member governments. In some cases it might be desirable to establish a high official in the institution responsible to government to facilitate a high official in the institution responsible to be concerned primarily with NATO affairs. The purpose would be to help both to common interests of the Atlantic Council, and in transmitting the results of such consultations into effective action within the institutions concerned.
