STUDENT LOANS-REPAYMENT BY MEDICAL STUDENTS DURING INTERNSHIP

Mr. Barry Mather (New Westminster): Mr. Speaker, I have a question I should like to ask the Secretary of State of External Affairs. Is it a fact, as reported yesterday in the Ottawa Journal, that the United States, through Mr. Cabot Lodge, has strongly advised or cautioned Canada against recognizing mainland China or supporting her admission to the United Nations?

Hon. Paul Martin (Secretary of State for External Affairs): Mr. Speaker, there was no discussion of that subject.

Right Hon. J. G. Diefenbaker (Leader of the Opposition): A supplementary question. Mr. Speaker. Is there any foundation for radio or television reports to the effect that as recognition of China is a matter that should take into consideration the feelings of our allies, recognition is to take place after the month of November and early in 1965?

Mr. Martin (Essex East): Mr. Speaker, I know of no grounds for suggesting that this will take place early in 1965. No one can
