- (1) Claimants who received payment for the same reference week in the month as that used by the Labour Force Survey to determine the number of unemployed.
- (2) Regular unemployment insurance benefits including benefits for trainees who have completed their courses but have not found work.
- (3) These claimants reported that they had no earnings and were ready, willing and able to work during the reference week. (This category comes the closest to the definition of unemployed in the Labour Force Survey which counts those who are seeking work and did not work at all during the reference week.)
- (4) Special benefits include sickness, maternity, retirement, fishing and benefits paid to trainees while on approved training courses.

2. The following table shows the number of unemployed for each month of 1974 based on the Labour Force Survey conducted by Statistics Canada. Unemployment levels ('000) for 1974 (not seasonally adjusted): January, 637; February, 635; March, 599; April, 568; May, 524; June, 469; July, 465; August, 447; September, 431; October, 430; November, 439; December, 597.
