REQUEST FOR DELAY OF BILL C-68-MOTION UNDER S.O. 43

SUGGESTED RETENTION OF INFLATION FACTOR—MOTION UNDER S.O. 43

REQUEST FOR REFERENDUM ON CAPITAL PUNISHMENT-MOTION UNDER S.O. 43

Mr. Armand Caouette (Villeneuve): Mr. Speaker, pursuant to Standing Order 43, I ask for the unanimous consent of the House to move a motion on a matter of pressing and urgent necessity.

Considering that the vast majority of Canadians favour upholding capital punishment in cases of premeditated deliberate murder, that the will of the majority must be respected in a democratic system, and that a referendum is the best way to let the majority express its views, I move, seconded by the hon. member for Rimouski (Mr. Allard):

That this House direct that a referendum on capital punishment be taken immediately across the country so that debates on the abolition of capital punishment take place in the light of the views clearly expressed by the Canadian people.

PROPOSED DEVELOPMENT OF AEROSPACE INDUSTRY IN VIEW OF LAY-OFFS AT DOUGLAS AIRCRAFT—MOTION UNDER S.O. 43
