



VON DER GOLTZ TO LEAD TURKS

German Autocrat Commander-in-Chief of Sultan's

First Army.

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 19.-Field Marshal Baron Kolmar Von Des Goltz has been appointed commanderin-chief of the first Turkish army.

Field Marshal Von Der Goltz re-cently returned to Constantinople from a trip to Berlin, the object of which is reported to have been to urge the German Government to send an army to attack Serbia. In the early part of the war he served as military governor of Belgium, and in January was sent by Germany to Constantinople to assist in directing the Turkish army, which he had re-constructed in earlier years.
