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APPOINTSETTLERS AS FIRE RANGERS

Province Will Form Staff of Men From the North.

CHANGE OF SYSTEM

Retrenchment Policy Will Reduce Number by Nearly Two Hundred.

A radical departure from precedent is being made in the appointment of Ontario fire rangers by the minister of lands, forests and mines this year. Men who will be placed in charge of the important duty of patrolling the northern woods and fighting down fire outbreaks will this year be chosen from among the settlers of the north, and must be eminently fitted for their work. In many cases applicants are their own sponsors entirely and are receiving employment of this character.

According to announcement of re-employment during the war season the department is cutting down the size of this staff, and whereas 578 were employed last year only 400 will be selected for 1915. Of these 122 have already been placed, and Hon. G. Howard Ferguson is proceeding with the completion of his list. By a judicious distribution of labor it is expected that the work will be efficiently carried out at a minimum of expense.

Students Looked Out. This will be the first year in which university students will be practically eliminated, and the government's action results from a desire to supply work to persons in the north who are suffering from the effects of the depression. In addition it is considered that men in actual contact with conditions in the woods the year round are pre-eminently fitted for this special protective work.

In very few instances will this plan be departed from, and the exceptions will occur when experts are required in some particular line either of navigation or woodcraft.

BLACKER PIRACY BERLIN'S THREAT

BERLIN, via London, April 19.—Referring to the appointment of the captain of the British steamer Thor as a lieutenant of the naval reserve and the award of a medal to him for sinking a German submarine, an official statement issued today said: "It is thereby shown that the British Government approves of rewards to men in actual contact with conditions on armed vessels contrary to international law. Such vessels may expect less than ever warning or consideration."

Lucky That "It" Came Along on the Half Hour.

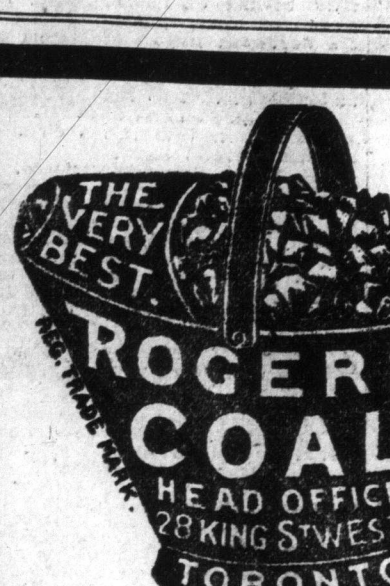
IT WAS A STRAW HAT

COURT WILL DECIDE VALIDITY OF PRIZE

Seizure of German Refugee Steamer From Tsingtau Protested.

ANSWER TO GERMANY

Sir Edward Grey Refers to Sinking of French Ship Ganteaume.

LONDON, April 19, 9 p.m.—The British foreign office tonight issued the correspondence which passed between the intermediaries, James W. Gerard and Walter H. Page, the American ambassadors at Berlin and London respectively, in which the German Government protested against the seizure by Great Britain of the German ship *Pakiet*, which was captured while carrying women and children from Tsingtau, the port of the German concessions in the Chinese Province of Shantung, to Tientsin. Interpretation of Hague. The German foreign office maintained that the seizure of the *Pakiet* violated the section of The Hague convention, rendering ships bound on a humanitarian mission exempt from seizure. The British foreign office replied that the *Pakiet* was engaged in the conveyance of women and children from a fortress about to be besieged, and that the vessel could not be regarded as bound upon a humanitarian mission within the meaning of the article; but that this view was still to be determined by a prize court, after due deliberation.

Case of Ganteaume. Sir Edward Grey ends his reply to Ambassador Page by calling attention to the case of the French refugee ship *Admiral Ganteaume*, which was torpedoed in the English Channel with regard for law or the dictates of humanity.

The British foreign secretary stated that in view of this, it would appear to be the contention of the German Government that Germany was entitled to sink without notice a

YOUNG MAN DROWNED NEAR GREENBUSH, ONT.

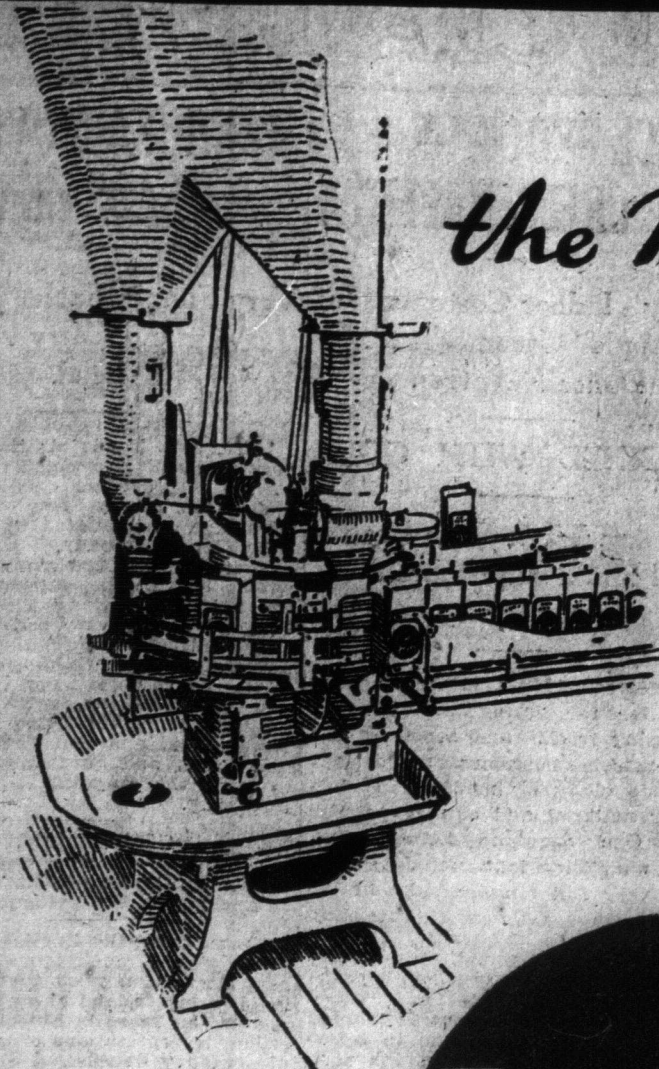

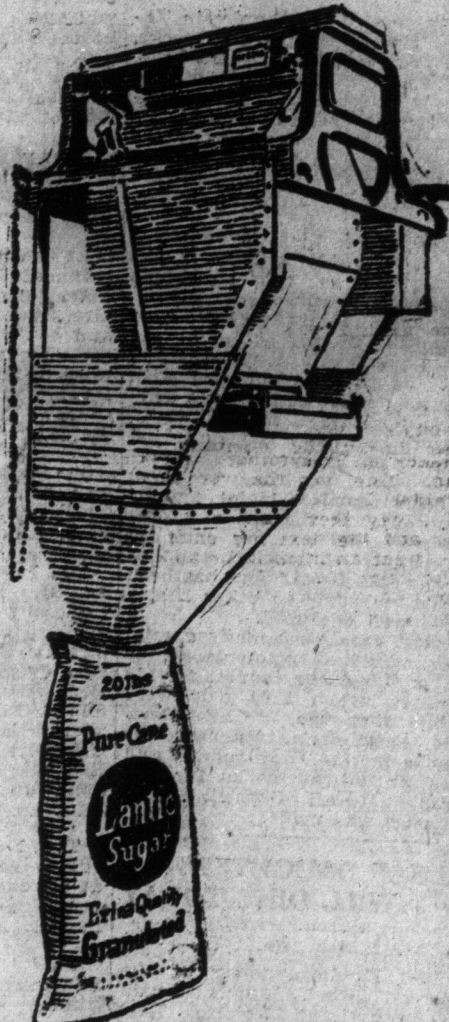
