When the Indians from this Province were permitted to go to the World's Fair, it was with the understanding that they were to illustrate the habits and mode of life of their fellow-countrymen, not the bar-baric rites practiced by their ancestors cen-turies ago, and which, the "Tamanawas" especially being mentioned, have long been probibited by British law. In British Col-umbia the "torture dance" has not been enacted for years, 49 Victoria, Cap 43, Sec. 114, making it an offence punishable by imprisonment for from two to six months, either to participate in or encourage the dance. The undertaking was also given when the Indians left home that they would be well cared for during their absence, and the Indian department hold that in allow-ing the dance the spirit of the agreement has been violated both by George Hunt and the Fair authorities. Of course, the pub-lished accounts of the dance may be accepted as somewhat exaggerated, for British Columbia Indians are particularly happy in devising spectacular effects, and the fairing torchlight would facilitate the hideous illusions in which the "Tamana-was" abounds.
