A stray dog on Mr. Maxwell's premises, Ferguson-avenue, was the other victim of the Chief's revolver. Portadown Lodge, Sons of Ireland E.S., attended divine service to St. John's Church yesterday afternoon. The procession was headed by the town band, and the Rev. Barnard Bryan of the Church of the Epiphany of Toronto preached an interesting sermon on the aims and objects of the society. The picnic under the auspices of the Toronto Junction Citizens' Band, on Saturday last, was well attended, and was in every way successful. The sporting events were all keenly contested. The C.P.R. team defeated the Loder bicycle club at baseball. The Llewellyn won the five-mile bicycle race. Dancing was continued till nearly midnight.

MR. CHAMBERLAIN'S VISIT. Colonial Secretary Coming at Special Invitation of President Cleveland. Montreal, Aug. 31.—(Special.) A gentleman who arrived from the States to-day told our correspondent that he was generally supposed in official circles over the line that the object of Hon. Joseph Chamberlain's visit to America was to confer with President Cleveland regarding the scheme to submit all disputes between England and the United States to arbitration. Mr. Chamberlain is coming over upon the express invitation of the President of the United States.

THIS IS THE OPENING DAY. Everything in Readiness for Premier Party to Press the Button This Afternoon.
