THE REVIVAL IN BUSINESS.

New York, Aug. 14.—The New York Financial Review says this week: The bank statement for the week ending Aug. 14 reflected more accurately than usual the revival in business, and is as might be expected under the circumstances of a most encouraging nature. The item of loans shows a continued expansion, the increase for the past week having been no less than \$3,000,000, which brings the total to \$55,170,000, or \$25,000,000 higher than any record made previous to this year. The past month's loans have increased no less than \$21,000,000, and in 40 days the expansion has been approximately \$42,000,000, which reveals conclusively the magnitude of the present upward movement. For the past week, no less than 50 of the 65 clearing house banks swelled their loan totals, the National City and Hanover National leading with combined increase of \$3,358,000. As there are no special causes to account for fluctuations in loans other than reviving stock exchange business, mercantile demands and enquiry for re-discounts, the healthy nature of the business which the New York banks are doing becomes apparent at a glance.

A DARING HOLD-UP.
