In reply to the Spanish attempt to win over Aguinaldo's men, the insurgents are said to have informed the Spaniards that they are neutral and will await events. The Spanish gunboat El Cano, which captured the American barque Saranac, loaded with coal, and owned by William Simpson, jr., of New York, has left liollo and gone to the Samanac owing to the fact that the steamer hoisted the British flag prior to her capture.
