An English Father Has a Sad Experience at New York.

London, Nov. 26.—"Dear Father,—I have gone to America. Goodbye."

A Manchester operative named Williamson, on returning home from work about three weeks ago, found this message, hastily scrawled on a piece of paper, left for him by his 15-year-old daughter, an attractive-looking mill girl.

Naturally he was thunderstruck. Taking the train to Liverpool, he found, after inquiries, that his daughter had sailed for the United States. The father followed the girl by the next steamer to endeavor to overtake his daughter, as to whose ultimate fate he had the gravest fears.

At New York, however, the officers of the immigration depot discovered that he had a weak heart, aggravated no doubt by his anxieties, and in spite of his appeals he was refused permission to land. After being detained for several days in the depot at Ellis Island he learned with dismay that he was to be sent back as physically unfit.

In a state of despair the unhappy man returned to Manchester and laid his case before the British Women's Emigration Association, and that society, of which the Queen is the patroness, is now doing its best to assist him in his search.

It is known that American agents have visited the cotton districts and secretly persuaded girls to emigrate, holding out promises of highly-paid work.

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"THE STOLEN STORY"
IS A GREAT PLAY

Made Tremendous Hit With Londoners at the Grand Last Night.

Londoners last night allowed a delightful attraction to slip past them, when "The Stolen Story," Jessie Lynch Williams' famous newspaper play, was produced at the Grand before what was a rather small audience.

The play is well known to Americans and enjoyed a tremendous run across the line, but Canadians are apparently not so well acquainted with it. London is the only city in Canada in which it plays, and it should certainly have packed the house.

"The Stolen Story" reveals to the public the inner workings of a newspaper office, with all the excitement and jealous watching which a gigantic "scoop" can inspire, and Mr. Lynch has succeeded in weaving a thread of heart interest and loveliness into the fabric of newspaper work, which forms an absorbing stage story full of life and action.

"The Stolen Story" is a play in four acts. It opens in the Berkshires, at General Cunningham's country home, and is then carried into a newspaper office to reveal the story of the "scoop," which is an exact reproduction of the city editor's room of the New York Sun.

Next the story finds its way into a theater in New York, and here one of the finest effects ever witnessed on a local stage is produced. A charity concert is being given in the theater, and as the dialogue proceeds in a room off the foyer, with each opening of the doors a burst of music floats out, mingled occasionally with the voices of the singers and the applause of the audience. The scene in the Berkshires is also one of surpassing stage magnificence.

The newspaper work revealed to the public was not overdone or burlesqued. It was intensely real. The cast, headed by the brilliant young actor, Mr. Harry Stone, was well "balanced and clever. Indeed, it is a somewhat difficult matter to find a cast of such an all-round, capable set of players have graced the stage of the Grand, for there were 23 professionals in the cast, besides a number of local supernumeraries.

Mr. Stone's work displayed an art which at once established him in the good graces of Londoners. Being an old newspaperman, he knew what he was doing and was satisfied to let natural, Edward Holt, as the city editor; Joseph M. Sparks, as Jerry McCarter; James Seelye, as General Cunningham; Frank Kerby, as Gilbert Townsend; Joseph Dalley, as Harry Llewellyn; and Miss Minnie Phillips as Miss Darro, the society reporter, were satisfying in their roles.

If it were possible for Manager Stewart to book "The Stolen Story" in later, there is every reason to believe Londoners would accord it the treatment to which it is entitled. The play is one of the best that ever came to London. The small audience at the Grand last night made up in enthusiasm what they lacked in numbers, and the applause was loud and frequent. Mr. Stone was given nine curtain calls.

There were but three ladies in the cast. Miss Mary Stockwell, an actress with an enviable reputation, was artistic and winsome in the part of Frances Cullen, and Miss Louise Royce as Mrs. Moffat, and Miss Minnie Phillips as Miss Darro, the society reporter, were satisfying in their roles.

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NOT DULL MOMENT AT VAUDEVILLE

Bill This Week Is Bright From Beginning to End—Mary Hampton Headliner.

There are no dull moments connected with Bennett's vaudeville offering this week. Of the seven turns (exclusive of the Bennettograph, with its laugh-producing films), there are at least four which could correctly be termed headliners.

Lynn and Faye, two dainty sou-brettes, do a singing and dancing turn that makes the old people feel young, and young folks feel younger.

The Victors, exponents of physical culture, entertain nicely, and Klein, Ott brothers and Nicholson precede the Bennettograph with an excellent musical turn.

Nearly every person in London was interested in the great baseball series between the Chicago Nationals and the White Sox, which took place recently, and the films on the moving picture machine showing "How the Office Boy Attended the Ball Game" present the team in full action, as they battled for the world's baseball championship on the Chicago diamond.
