Dr. Jose Congosto Says No Reconcentrados Are Left.

He Claims There Was No Sufficient Reason for the Surrender of Santiago.

Among the passengers who arrived in New York on the steamer City of Washington, from Favana, were Dr. Jose Congosto and Capt. Fred Sharp, of the Merritt & Chapman Wrecking Company.

Dr. Congosto said: "The evacuation of Cuba by Spain is a matter of time, but when I left Havana everything was progressing well. I do not care to enter into all the reasons for the delay, but one of the principal causes is the fact that we have over 6,000 sick, who must be taken care of,

and cannot be left behind. "The problem of the future of the sland is a difficult one, and I have studied it without prejudice, and as a result of this study of years, I believe that it is a social problem and not a political one. Of course poli-tics will enter into the solution, but the great question is how to bring the most prosperity and the greatest hap-piness to the people of Cuba. Santiago should not have fallen as it did, and if Toral had not entered into negotiations with the enemy it is likely that there would have been a different story to tell today. It is not true that the Spanish army there lacked supplies and ammunition, for they had plenty of both, which they turned over to the Americans. If Toral had pushed forward instead of retreating toward the city, he certainly would have caused a repulse. There are things which he will have to explain."

STORMS AT SEA

Steamer and Schooner Encounter Heavy Gales-Captain Nordland Drowned.

Port Townsend, Wash., Sept. 30.-The steamship Faralon has arrived from Hi Lynn Canal ports, bringing 70 passengers from various sections of Southwestern Alaska.

Sept. 26 the Faralon picked up the wreck of the schooner Capella on Sea-forth Channel, and towed her to Bella Della. The Capella sailed from Seat-tle for Wrangel, and on Sept. 20, when 300 miles of Cape Flattery, a heavy gale was encountered. The lit-tle schooner's boats and passengers were carried away, and Capt. James Nordland was washed overboard and drowned.

The returns of yesterday's voting, as far as received, indicate a majority of about 13,500 in the entire Dominion for prohibition. In some places the vote was much smaller than that cast at recent elections, and in sime there has been a marked turn-over. In Toronto, the majority has been almost completely reversed since the time of the last plebiscite. In 1894, the figures were 11,-407 for prohibition and 8,879 against. Yesterday they were 8,696 for and 11,950 against. The majority for in Ontario is less than in 1894, when it was over 80,000. Little Gordon Farrow Has an Arm Torn Off.

Was Struck by a Yard Engine at the Burwell Street Orossing-Fatal Result Feared.

But the boy rested quietly last night, and this morning it is thought that his recovery is probable

A GOOD MAN GONE.


Philadelphia, Pa., Sept. 30.-Col. Joseph M. Bennett, a philanthropist, died yesterday morning at his home in this city, of Bright's disease, aged 82 years. Col. Bennett began his work of philanthropy in 1880, when he donoted 40 acres, in what is now a section of Fairmont Park, valued at \$400,000, for the erection of the Methodist Orphanage, and afterwards contributed largely to its support. He also donated valuable properties to the University of Pennsylvania, the Deaf and Dumb Institute and the Methodist Deaconesses. His property is said to be worth \$3,000,000, and it is estimated that Col. Bennett's charity amounted to \$1,000,000.
