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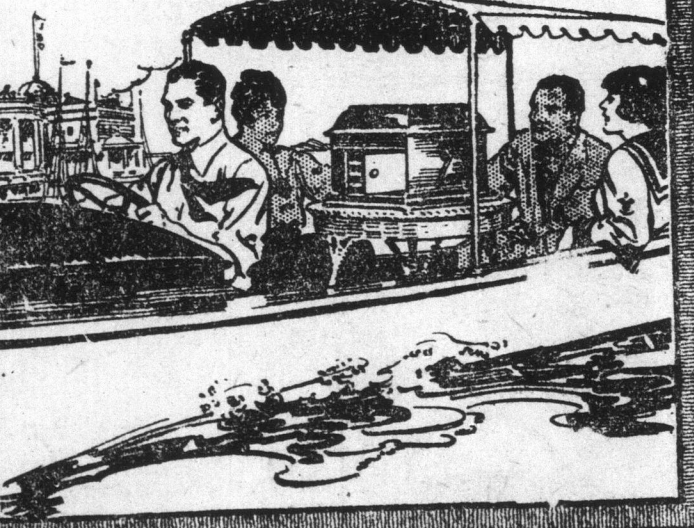
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OTTAWA ORDERS RESISTANCE TO ANY ATTEMPTED ARREST OF COURT-DEFYING OFFICER IS GEDDES' WORD

Sheriff Informs Court He Cannot Apprehend Lieut.-Col. Moore.

FOUND AT BARRACKS

Commander There, However, Refused to Allow Justice to Step In.

CALGARY, Alta., July 11.—That drastic action is pending in the Moore case is deemed certain, Sheriff Graham reported to Mr. Justice Stewart, Mr. Justice Beetz and to Chief Justice MacKay, today, that he had located Lieut.-Col. Moore at the Victoria Barracks, but that there he had encountered Col. McDonald, officer commanding, who informed him that instructions had been received from Ottawa to resist the arrest ordered by the commission. Sheriff Graham explained to the court that he thereupon considered it advisable to report back to the court, without an attempt to enforce the mandate by placing Lieut.-Col. Moore in custody for the reason he feared physical resistance.

Immediately upon receipt of this information the court ordered that all the soldiers in the cases involved and Major Carson, representing the military, be ordered to appear at 2 o'clock on Thursday afternoon at the courthouse. At this appearance Solicitor Muir, representing the minister of justice, stated that it was from the minister of justice, and pleaded for the court to consider the case, Solicitor Muir did not read the telegram, but explained its contents.

Protecting People's Rights. J. L. Varley, representing the men seeking habeas corpus, then rose and said he considered the minister's request a reasonable one. Mr. Varley had spoken of the dignity of the court having been flouted, and the chief justice commenting upon this explained that the court was in no way concerned with its dignity as such.

Chief Justice Harvey stated that he had no objection to putting off further consideration until 10 o'clock Friday morning, providing the solicitor representing the military would communicate with the minister of justice in the meantime and secure an order instructing the military to comply with the orders of the court.

JAIL SENTENCES FOR QUEBEC OFFICERS.

QUEBEC, July 11.—Col. Rogers and other officers of the Laval C. O. T. C. will be jailed on July 17 if they have not produced in court one Edward Durand of Loveterville, Que., on a writ of habeas corpus. This writ was granted today. Armand Lavigne appears for Durand in a case of a writ of habeas corpus issued for Durand. The writ was returnable yesterday afternoon, and the officers failed to appear to bring in their man. Justice Dorion stated that if on July 17 the officers in question have not appeared with their grates they will be sent to jail.

MOTHER POISONS BABES, THEN BURNS THE HOME

MONTREAL, July 11.—Called to a fire at 835 Brodeur street this afternoon, firemen on their arrival found every door and window tightly closed. When they broke through they came upon the bodies of Mrs. F. Dupont and her four children, of ages ranging from 8 years to 3 months old. A letter, written by Mrs. Dupont, was also found, stating her intention of committing suicide and dying with her four children.

The bodies were taken outside the house to permit the firemen to overcome the blast and the husband, returning from work, had his first notification of his wife's death when he saw the bodies. The shock was so great that he fainted. The tragedy was discovered by a neighbor, who tried to enter the house, and was nearly overcome with smoke and gas fumes. It was not until the firemen arrived that the bodies were found.

It is alleged that Mrs. Dupont had first made the children drink Java water, a poison, before setting fire to the house. According to the neighbors she had been worried by the sickness of her baby, and the loss of a sum of money by her husband, but up to yesterday had been normal.

Clash Between Provincial and Federal Powers Seems Inevitable.

GOVERNMENT HELD CAUSE

Disregard of Parliament Has Precipitated Present Situation in Alberta.

OTTAWA, July 11.—There can now be no manner of doubt as to the attitude of the Government toward the finding of the highest court of Alberta regarding the Government's order-in-council which abolishes exemptions granted by act of parliament. The order-in-council is to disregard the finding in so far as the securing of further drafts is concerned, but they are to be disregarded as a consequence of men who were ordered produced are being sent overseas, while Lieut.-Col. Moore who acted under the Government's instructions and refused to produce the bodies of twelve men, has been charged, was in hiding, an outlaw from the provincial authorities. It is intimated that if he is apprehended, tried, convicted and imprisoned for contempt of the courts he will be released by recommendation of the minister of justice.

Clash Inevitable. Federal military law has to all intents and purposes superseded civil law in the Province of Alberta, and a clash between the provincial and federal authorities is inevitable. The Government plea is "military expediency." Since only about 20 men are immediately affected it is difficult to see how the plea can be justified. As a matter of fact the Government has got itself into a difficult situation through its disregard in the first place of the prerogatives of Parliament. Having defied Parliament it is now driven to defy the courts of the Province of Alberta.

In the meantime, while one of the most important legal controversies in the history of the Dominion is raging, the following personal announcement from the Government is of interest.

"Hon. Hugh Guthrie, solicitor-general, will represent the Government of Canada at the inter-Allied exposition to be held at San Francisco."

ASKS STAY OF TWO WEEKS' TIME.

OTTAWA, July 11.—Stay of proceedings in the Calgary habeas corpus case is to be applied for on behalf of the department of justice. "It is humbly suggested," reads a statement which the minister of justice has telegraphed to James Muir, Calgary, representing the department of justice, a statement which Muir is to read in court when the hearing of the case is resumed on the gravity of the present circumstances that all further judicial proceedings locally should be determined by the supreme court of Canada of the questions arising therefrom. The statement emphasizes the gravity of the situation and the order-in-council declaring that the April order-in-council is invalid. "It is considered," the statement says, "that the administration of the regulations in question cannot compatibly with the public safety, be suspended. Delay must be avoided. And," concludes the telegram, "it is most respectfully submitted that in respect to the court or to the individual by such a suspension of judicial proceedings, is vastly outweighed by the irretrievable consequences which threaten the commonwealth if in this time of crisis, necessary military operations are impeded by the execution of an order, which within a short time may not be impossible be reversed for error."

STATEMENT WILL BE OFFICIALLY ISSUED.

[Canadian Press.] OTTAWA, July 11.—An official statement outlining the position of the Government in regard to the Calgary situation, is in preparation, and it is expected it will be issued in the course of the day. The statement, it is understood, will emphasize the reasons which led to the passing of the order-in-council cited before the Alberta court of appeals.

"The order-in-council," stated Hon. C. J. Doherty, acting premier, today powering the minister of militia to put into effect the announced policy of the Government in regard to the Calgary case.

The policy referred to was outlined in a statement issued by the Government on July 2. After reciting the circumstances of the Lewis case, the announcement proceeded as heretofore in official circles that the order-in-council declared invalid by the Alberta supreme court, it is fully admitted that a difficult situation has arisen. The order-in-council in question was passed under the general powers of the war measures act. Under those powers many other orders-in-council respecting war activities have been passed and might also be called into question. If the constitutional point is pressed to the extreme, temporary dislocation of the war effort might result with grave consequences not only in regard to the constant supply of reinforcements overseas but also to war measures at home.

Any steps taken as a consequence of the Alberta judgment, it is understood, were taken because of the urgent need for men. There was no desire to provoke a conflict between the civil and military authorities.

In regard to Col. Moore, it is announced that, in the event of his apprehension, effort will be made to see that he is adequately defended.

CIVIC STRIKERS AT TORONTO RETURNING TO WORK AT ONCE

TORONTO, July 11.—Mayor Church late this afternoon at a mass meeting of the strikers in the Labor Temple announced that the city council, by a vote of 16 to 8, has agreed to the men's request for a board of arbitration to thoroughly investigate the various questions at issue. The announcement was greeted with loud and prolonged cheering.

KILLED BY SHELL

Brilliant Italian Commander, Gen. Fodini, Meets Death After Victory.

First Lord of British Admiralty Declares U-Boats Freedom Cut Down.

SUBS HEMMED IN BY MINE FIELDS.

LONDON, July 11.—Speaking in London today Sir Eric Geddes, first lord of the British admiralty, said that mines gradually were hemming in the submarines, which now had less freedom, and he was glad to be able to say that there were fewer of them.

In referring to the great mine fields which were so notably restricting the submarines, Sir Eric said they stretched from Norway to the coast of Scotland. There was a barrage across the Straits of Dover, he added, and mines in the English Channel. Some of the fastest of the navy, which certainly should be ranked as the corps de elite, journeyed to the night to lay them. Occasionally an enemy submarine tries to break through the Dover barrage. Sir Eric Geddes was speaking at the opening of an exhibition of naval war pictures. He said it was impossible to photograph or to tell all that the British navy was doing. He told his audience, however, of some of the achievements of the marine chasers.
