

Will Provide Medical Aid for 800 Settlers in Saskatchewan.

PRINCE ALBERT, Sask., June 21.1-The first Red Cross outpost hospital in Canada is being erected in the Paddockwood region jointly by the people of the district, the Red Cross and the businessmen of this city.

nessmen of this city.

This district, embracing 30,000 square miles, holds about 800 settlers, 350 of whom are married. They have all been from twenty or fifty miles from the nearest doctor or hospital, which at times has created a serious condition. Regarded as one of the richest mixed farming countries in the Dominion, this region along the Canadian National Railways is attracting many settlers, especially soldiers, and the only drawback has been the lack of adjacent medical attention for sickness or accident.
