IMPOSTORS SECURING POSITIONS IN DETROIT

Masquerade As Heroes of War—Border Veterans Register Strong Protest.

WINDSOR, July 23.—Masquerading as heroes of the war, and veterans of Canadian and Imperial forces, scores of impostors are securing positions from Detroit industrial firms and business places by displaying service buttons. As a result of this situation general complaint against which has become prevalent recently, the Border Command of the G. W. V. A. today forwarded a resolution to Ottawa asking that negotiations be opened with Washington immediately and an effort made to have legislation passed as would render the wearing of veterans' badges by men who never went overseas illegal in the United States as well as in Canada.

OVER \$2,000 IN FINES AND COSTS PAID IN KENT COUNTY POLICE COURT

Magistrate Arnold Imposes Heavy Fines in O. T. A. Cases.

CHATHAM, July 23.—Roy O'Neil was fined \$1,000 and costs and forfeited a large amount of liquor for an offence against the O. T. A. His case has been before the city police court for some time. Floyd Bennett, who was implicated with O'Neil, was found guilty of carrying liquor and was assessed \$500 and costs.
