EXCHANGE RATE AND SPECULATION STOP
EXPORT OF BUTTER
Wholesale Merchants Worry Over Present Trade Conditions.

MONTREAL, Oct. 22.—The export of butter is practically non-existent and wholesale butter merchants here are exercised over their position. Canada produces more butter than she can consume, it is claimed, and she must export the balance. Some butter has been exported to European countries it appears, but Canada's big customer for butter is Great Britain and the price set by the British Government is considerably too low for merchants here unless they are willing to take a heavy loss. The rate of exchange is the main factor that prevents sales, but besides that is speculation, which it is claimed, has caused merchants to lay in heavy stocks at unduly high prices.

NO OFFICIAL WORD OF RIORDAN PULP CO. PLAN
MONTREAL, Oct. 22.—Directors of the Riordan Pulp and Paper Company adjourned today, after protracted consideration of the impending share capital reorganization of the enterprise. No official statement was forthcoming. It is believed in well informed circles that holders of the present securities will be asked to approve of a plan whereby to be decided upon by the directors, to issue three and a half shares of no par value stock for each share of old of a par value of \$100 presently held.

DIED IN SARNIA.
MELBOURNE, Oct. 22.—Dr. A. T. Brown and Mrs. Brown left today to attend the funeral of the former's father, Francis Brown, who died on Thursday at his home in Sarnia at the age of 85 years. He was born in Yorkshire, England, and came to Canada when seven years of age, and lived in Montreal for a number of years. Mr. Brown was a member of the Methodist Church for over 60 years, a class-leader and an active temperance worker and a member of the general missionary committee of the London Conference. He leaves five sons and three daughters: Rev. A. T. Brown, pastor of the Methodist Church, Melbourne; Rev. A. H. Brown of Woodville; Rev. G. E. Brown, Conklin, Michigan; Albert J. of Sarnia; Joseph B. Brown of Port Huron. Mrs. George Sheperdon of Port Huron, Mrs. John W. Henry of Sarnia and Mrs. A. Tomlin of Port Huron.

PEELINGS ESSENTIAL.
CHICAGO, Oct. 22.—Apple and potato peelings are quite essential to the diet, according to Dr. S. R. Boynton, of Bellingham, Wash., who read a paper before the Society of Physical Therapists at the Hotel La Salle. Sour milk and oatmeal, he said, also were to be recommended. And the reason the Scotsman was so hale and hearty, he added, was because he lived on oatmeal and the grace of God.

COFFEE PRICES ARE BEING REDUCED
Many Other Grocery Lines Are Coming Down Also.

The following comment on the market situation as regards food stuffs appears in Canadian Grocer this week:
There are not many price changes manifested in the markets during the week. The tendency on most lines of commodities is for a gradual movement downward. Business and collections are reported satisfactory by wholesalers and retailers, although buyers continue to confine purchases to day to day requirements.

Montreal—Slightly easier prices are quoted this week on beef; beef cattle have been arriving in better supply. The change is not large, amounting to one or two cents a pound on certain cuts of meat. The egg market holds very firm at the high prices. Butter shows a strong market with an advance of one cent per pound. The lard market is very strong and shortening is also strong in sympathy with the lard market. The market for cooked meats has fallen off in demand owing to the cooler weather. Sugar is in a very unsettled condition. There may be a very sharp change in the prices within a few days and on the other hand—present prices may hold for some time. There

is a reduction of ten cents a gallon on the price of molasses. There is a general reduction in the price of nuts. Figs are lower and the quotations on evaporated apples show a reduction of four cents a pound. California dried fruits will this year be scarce and very expensive. Some Norwegian sardines are one dollar a case cheaper. The tea market shows more strength for the better grades. Coffee is expected to decline another cent a pound by the first of the month. Lamp chimneys are 25 and 35 cents a dozen dearer.

Toronto—The markets generally continue to show indications for a gradual downward movement, although with the exception of cereals few price changes have been effected. Business on sugar has been practically suspended pending the outcome of the conference between the Government and the refiners. Most wholesalers are offering sugar below the present market price. It has been intimated from a reliable source that sugar would be ruling at a lower basis by the end of the week. The raw sugar market during the week has been quiet with rather a steady undertone. The weak condition on the grain market is reflected in the market for cereals and a further decline can be expected. Cornmeal and rolled oats has shown another decline during the week.

RAN IN FROM PLAY FOUND MOTHER DEAD
Little Daughter of Mrs. Geo. Spotton, Wingham, Has Sad Experience.

WINGHAM, Oct. 22.—Running into her home from play about 6 o'clock this evening, little 12-year-old Glennan Spotton, found her mother dead on the couch. At first the little girl thought her mother was asleep and made an effort to rouse her, but getting no response ran to a neighbor's for help, which was at once given, and a doctor called, who pronounced life extinct. Death had evidently followed a sudden attack of heart-failure, for Mrs. Spotton was down town apparently in her usual health at 4:30 p.m. Ex-Mayor Spotton, who was in Toronto, was immediately notified. The deceased lady was the daughter of Mr. John Glen of Lindsay, in which town she was born, coming to reside in Wingham about 17 years ago.
