This recommendation, made in the majority report of the commission, submitted this morning, was approved amids a great uproar made by the socialists in the conference, who favored the minority report. Bohm said the plan was to colonize Palestine by the settlement there of Jews without means, by buying land out of the Jewish National Fund and employing Jewish labor exclusively. The settlers should place themselves unhesitatingly under control of the fund, Bohm added, and agree to eventual nationalization of the land.

The speakers on behalf of the minority report declared that the true Zionist ideals would be lost sight of, and that Palestine could never be properly developed unless there were complete nationalization.
