# FELIX DOYLE ON THE STANF

Evidence Points to Son, Who is Kept Imprisoned at Home of County Constable Shaver.

Club Killed Her.

A new phase developed to-day when a heavy club was found. The club is about a yard long and has a strip of iron on one side. One end is covered with blood. The club is so heavy that a light blow with it on the head would cause death. Felix had this club hidden in the straw in the pig pen, but persists in saying he brought at there from the gate down the lane, where he found it. He says the club was never in the house. He admits it is a piece of his wagon, and once said it might have been in the yard. He told the jury how he and his mother always got on well together. County Crown Attorney Wilkes has the case in hand, while A. Baird of this city appeared on behalf of Felix. The authorities are confident they have the death-dealing weapon in the bloodstained club.
