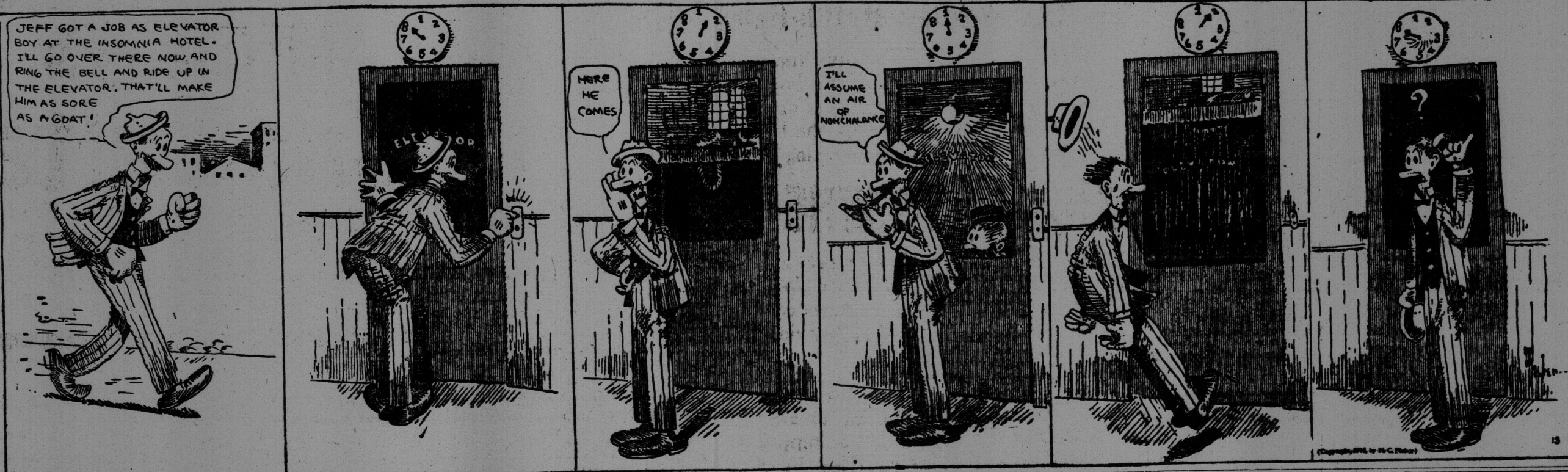

Johnson Behind Footlights.

Johnson, erstwhile heavyweight cham-  
pion, is now an actor, says a London

titled "Seconds Out," now running at a  
suburban music hall. Johnson, who is  
surrounded by a cast of white actors, is  
the hero of the piece.

Fight on River Bank.

At Biddeford, Me., on Wednesday,  
Bay Wood of Fall River, and George  
Alger of Cambridge, Mass., fought a  
twelve-round bout to a draw in the open  
air. The bout was one of the most rug-  
ged witnessed there in years. While the  
first six rounds were even, boxing fans  
said Alger had a shade the best of the  
last six. In the fourth round of the  
first bout the pair went through the  
ropes, landing on the stone abutment on  
the river bank and coming within a foot  
of falling into the river. On the stone  
wall they began pounding each other  
again, and were just about to roll off  
when they were rescued by a special of-  
ficer.

that it whizzed like a hornet.

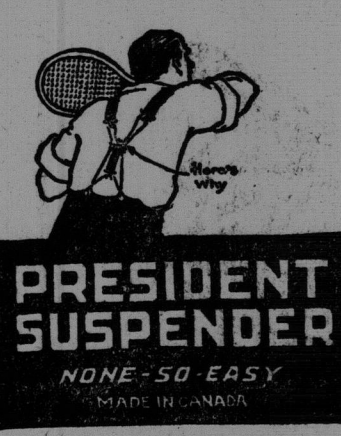
Sharks Defeated Acadias.
