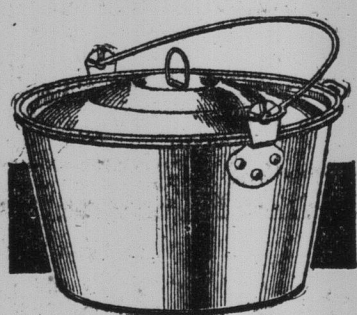

LITTLE FAITH IN TALK OF PEACE

(J. M. Robinson & Sons' private wire telegram.)
New York, Feb. 3.—There is a great deal of skepticism, now developing in regard to the German willingness to discuss peace on a basis of equality, to win the war and the talk of internal disturbances. It is argued that, Zeppelin raiding and preparation for a winter drive, plainly seen, would not be going on in such case. It is held in expert-enced market quarters that the volume of supply and demand of and for stocks has had more to do with the recent recovery in prices than peace talks or other factor except the taking over of the railroads by the government. BOSTON LEADS U. S. CITIES IN NUMBER OF BRITISH RECRUITS.
Boston, Feb. 3.—Boston led the cities of the United States in the number of men recruited last month for the British forces, the British-Canadian recruiting mission announced today. Six hundred and seventy-eight men were accepted for service out of 1,026 examined in this city. New York was next with 428 men accepted.

NO CHANGE IN DOMINION POLICY IS CONTEMPLATED

Will Enforce the Recent Liquor Legislation

STATEMENT BY MINISTER

Government Will Not Heed Appeals for Modification of Law Dealing With Importation, Manufacture and Transportation

Ottawa, Feb. 4.—Speaking here tonight at a mass meeting of temperance workers and others, who expressed approval of the government's legislation, Hon. N. W. Rowell, president of the privy council, stated that representations had been made from influential quarters urging the government to modify its policy as announced by the prime minister, and on the other hand influential representations had been made that the policy should not be modified, and that public opinion was behind the government. Mr. Rowell announced that he had been authorized by the prime minister to state that, after giving due consideration to these representations, he saw no adequate reason for the government modifying the policy as announced on Dec. 22.
Referring to the policy of the union six months ago on the liquor question, Mr. Rowell said it was based on the legislation already passed by the various provinces, and was intended to be complementary to such legislation. It had been realized by the government that it would be much easier to enforce the measure through the agency of provincial machinery than by setting up any means of enforcement, and consequently, Mr. Rowell said, the federal orders-in-council dealt only with the importation, manufacture, transportation, leaving the question of sale to be dealt with by the provinces.
In all provinces save one, action had been taken on the liquor question, said Mr. Rowell, and, referring to Quebec, he said the greater number of the municipalities there had gone dry.
Mr. Rowell said he believed the legislation enacted, came well within the limits of the measures set. It would continue for the duration of the war and one year afterwards.
He said the government action came at one of the most critical hours of the war. He predicted that the next six months would be the most critical half year since the war broke out. The government called upon the people of Canada to give their best in arms, food, production, munitions, ships, so that when democracy met autocracy in final conflict, victory would be assured, and democracy triumph.


