Paris, Jan. 8—The reparations commission, with the British delegate, Sir John Bradbury, voting, yesterday agreed unanimously upon the interpretation of Article 3 of the financial agreement signed by the allied finance ministers in Paris on March 11, last fixing the apportionment among the Allies of the German reparations in kind delivered during the year 1922. France receives 65 per cent of the deliveries and the remaining 35 per cent is divided among the other Allies.

STEVE HURLEY INJURED.



Spencer, and who later accepted the position of manager of the Spa Theatre at Pittsfield, Mass., was painfully hurt a few nights ago when the doorman of the theatre was attacked by two young men and who on going to his assistance was tripped on the stairway.

The Birkshire Eagle of Pittsfield says that Robert Jones, the doorman at the Spa Theatre on going to lock the door of the theatre was suddenly confronted by two men, about twenty-two or twenty-three years of age, who hit him from behind. Ottawa, Jan. 8—The coldest weather of the winter was experienced in Ottawa and district over the week-end when the mercury, starting at twenty above, the lowest temperature on Friday night, went down steadily until by Saturday midnight it had dropped thirty-seven degrees, registering seventeen below, the lowest so far this season.

SOON HAVE NETWORK OF HYDRO LINES IN PROVINCE

Fredericton, N. B., Jan. 8—"A rapidly growing demand for large blocks of power for use in connection with the pulp and paper industry," is given as the reason why the Grand Falls on the St. John river, "may be taken over by the government" and developed by the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission "in the near future" in a letter which C. O. Foss, chief engineer of the commission, has written to Alderman Joseph A. Cain, president of the Fredericton Board of Trade.

This statement, the Gleaner says, fully confirms the report to the effect that an important change in the policy for hydro electric development in this province is under consideration and that the early development of the Grand Falls power is embraced in the new plant. "Following the development of this power (Grand Falls), a net-work of transmission lines will undoubtedly be constructed covering the whole province," also wrote Mr. Foss.
