

The danger signs are to be located at a distance of 300 feet from the point of danger, excepting in cases where the local surroundings will not permit of the erection of the same, in which case the selected location shall not be less than 300 feet from the danger point. All danger and other signs are to be located at the right hand side of the road, face approaching traffic at right angles with the highway, the inside edge of the sign to be as close to the traveled portion of the road as possible. In places where it is necessary to warm vehicles approaching a highway bridge narrower than the roadway, and in other cases where such warning is necessary, the words "Narrow Bridge" will take the place of a symbol. The conference also favored the painting of a white line four inches in width in the centre of a hard surfaced roadway, the full length of the curve to assist traffic to keep to the right of the centre of the roadway, especially at night, and thus aid in the prevention of accidents. A further resolution was that only such signs for the direction and safety of the public as may be approved by the provincial government may be used within the boundary of any rural highway or later.
