## WEEKLY WEATHER SYNOPSIS.

Victoria Meteorological Office, 8th to 14th June, 1904.

The weather during this week has been generally fair and warm throughout the province. A copious and much needed rain fall occurred on the 8th and 9th over Van couver Island and the Lower Mainland This was caused by an ocean low barometer area spreading across the province to the Rockies. On the other hand the rainfall in Cariboo has amounted to practically not ing, while during the same period last week rain fell upon every day. The summer type of high barometric pressure has prevailed on the Coast, while between the ranges the barometer has remained abnormally low. These conditions have caused a large proportion of cool westerly winds, and particu arly on the Straits of Fuca and Georgia. The average daily sunshine recorded here amounted to over 9 hours, and the greatest

daily amount was 14 hours on the 14th. The warmest day in this vicinity was Sunday, the 12th. It was caused by the barometer being higher to the northward of this, which permitted the dry and warm

moderately warm and showers or thunderstorms have been of frequent occurrence while in Manitoba the rainfall amounted to ver one inch.


