New York, July 20.—New York's chances for the National League pennant received a serious setback this afternoon when in the 7th inning of the game with St. Louis, Christy Mathewson, the team's star pitcher, had the second finger of his left hand broken in stopping a liner from Deleahanty's bat. Mathewson has been New York's one consistent winner this season and has not been defeated since May 24.

Butler, Pa., July 20.—The strike which, for four days has tied up the Standard Steel Car Company's works was settled late today, and the 3,500 employees of the plant will return to work tomorrow morning.
